





ELECTORAL DIVISION PROFILES: AN INTRODUCTION

These profiles have been produced to support elected members, constituents and other interested parties in understanding the demographic, economic, social and educational profile of their neighbourhoods. We have used the latest data available at the time of publication.

Much more data is available from national and local sources than is captured here, but it is hoped that the profile will be a useful starting point for discussion, where local knowledge and experience can be used to flesh out and illuminate the information presented here.

The profile can be used to help look at some fundamental questions e.g.

- Does the age profile of the population match or differ from the national profile?
- Is there evidence of the ageing profile of the county in all the wards in the Division or just some?
- How diverse is the community in terms of ethnicity?
- What is the impact of deprivation on families and residents?
- Does there seem to be a link between deprivation and school performance?
- What is the breakdown of employment sectors in the area?
- Is it a relatively healthy area compared to the rest of the district or county?
- What sort of crime is prevalent in the community?

You can also build your own reports by different themes and topics.


Technical Notes:

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE - AGE


In mid 2015, the population of Thedwastre South stood at 9,111, an increase of 2.9% since the 2011 Census. The age structure of the component wards and the division as a whole is set out below.

- The age pyramid for Thedwastre South shows a higher than average proportion of adults over the age of 45 and much lower proportions of those under 35 than nationally
- The commonest age groups in the division are 50-54 years and 65-69 years
- Thedwastre South has a relatively large proportion of those aged over 65, and a smaller proportion of young children

ETHNICITY




- According to the latest data (2011 Census), 98.1% (8,689) of the population of Thedwastre South are white, higher than the rate for Suffolk
- There are 164 (1.9%) people of black or minority ethnic origin in the division, similar to Mid Suffolk overall
- Thedwastre South has a similar diversity profile to Mid Suffolk district, and lower proportions of minority ethnic groups than Suffolk as a whole

ECONOMY


There are 2,100 people employed in Thedwastre South.



- The key employment sectors in Thedwastre South are education and health
- Education and health are particularly important as these sectors make up just over 45% of total
 jobs in Thedwastre South a much larger proportion than seen across Great Britain as a whole
- Construction and wholesale, retail and motor trades also provide a significant number of jobs in the division

LABOUR MARKET

JOB SEEKERS ALLOWANCE CLAIMANT RATE



- Thedwastre South has seen a reduction in the rate of Job Seekers Allowance claimants since the end of 2014
- The rate of claimants in this Division has consistently been lower than district, county and national averages, although has occasionally risen above the district rate
- In February 2017, around 0.3% of the working age population is claiming JSA. This is similar to the district average, but considerably below the county and national levels



Foundation Stage Profile (reception)

% pupils achieving Good Level of Development




- Foundation Stage attainment at schools in Thedwastre South has improved over the past three years
- Great Finborough CEVCP School has seen consistently above average attainment from 2014 to 2016
- Rattlesen and Thurston Church of England Primary Academies saw below average attainment in 2014 but results improved significantly in the two most recent years, with attainment at Rattlesden being at or close to the national benchmark while Thurston saw well above average attainment

Key Stage 2 (age 11)

Pupil Achievement in all three subjects, Reading, Writing and Mathematics (2014–2015 as % Level 4 or better & 2016 % Expected Level or better)

In July 2016, there was a change in the way pupil achievement is measured at the end of KS2. Prior to 2016, pupils received National Curriculum Level grades for English and Maths, with L4 being the expected level at the end of Key Stage 2. In 2016 the measure scaled score and shows whether or not a pupil has achieved the national standard for that subject




- No data is available for all schools in Thedwastre South for 2014 and for Great Finborough CEVCP School for 2015, due to changes affected by the Schools Organisation Review
- Attainment at Rattlesden Church of England Primary Academy has been below average in the last two years of data
- Attainment at Thurston Church of England Primary Academy was also low in 2015 but matched the national average in 2016
- 2016 Foundation Stage attainment at Great Finborough CEVCP School was well above the national average, with 73% of pupils achieving a Good Level of Development compared to 53% nationwide

GCSE (Key Stage 4) (age 16)

In July 2016, an additional measure of pupil achievement at Key Stage 4 was introduced but for the purposes of this profile and to demonstrate change over time, we have presented consistent data for the period 2014-2016 using the % pupils achieving five or more GCSEs (or equivalent) at A*-C including English and Mathematics.




- GCSE attainment at Thurston Community College was above county and national averages in 2014
- 2015 saw a decline in performance, taking it below county and national figures
- Although the school improved in 2016, attainment remained below the Suffolk and national level

A Level (Key Stage 5) (age 18)


Average point score per student

In 2016 there was a change in the way pupil achievement is measured at the end of KS5 and so the trend over time should not therefore be considered. The relative level of attainment at schools in the Electoral Division versus the Suffolk and National averages can still be seen.



 A level attainment at Thurston Community College has remained consistently at or above the national average over the past three years

NEET % (NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING)




- In January 2017, 2% of 16-18 year olds in Thedwastre South were classified as NEET (where current activity is known)
- NEET levels in Thedwastre South have generally fallen over the last three years and are consistently lower than the rate for Mid Suffolk and Suffolk


INDEX OF MULTIPLE DEPRIVATION (IMD) 2015 (SEE MAP OVERLEAF)

The IMD combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. Small areas (Lower Super Output Areas, average population 1,500) are most usually described as being in 1 of 5 quintile bands. The bottom quintile represents the 20% of areas that are the most deprived in the country; these are shaded red on the map. The top quintile represents the least deprived areas in the country, and is shaded green.

The Index is widely used to analyse patterns of deprivation, identify areas that would benefit from special initiatives or programmes and as a tool to determine eligibility for specific funding streams.




- The IMD 2015 shows that relative deprivation levels in Thedwastre South are generally fairly low, with none of the population falling into the most deprived or next most deprived categories
- Of the five Lower Super Output Areas comprising the division, two are in the least deprived quintile, two are in second least deprived quintile and one is in the middle quintile



HEALTH


The local data used here is based on relatively small numbers. The confidence limits provide an indication of the reliability of the data. The 95% confidence intervals utilised on the chart provide a range within which there is 95% chance of the true result lying.

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH




- Estimated life expectancy at birth for males in Thedwastre South is just below the Mid Suffolk estimate and just above the county as a whole and the UK
- The female life expectancy at birth figure for the division is just below that for Mid Suffolk, similar to the county and just above the country as a whole
- The estimated life expectancy at birth for males in the division is 81 years, 2.6 years below the female life figure which stands at 83.6 years

DEATHS, UNDER 75 YEARS, STANDARDISED MORTALITY RATIO



- The death rate for all causes for those under 75 in Thedwastre South is higher than the district rate, but lower than the county and the UK
- The standardised mortality ratio data shown here means that for every 100 early deaths from all causes across the UK as a whole, there are an estimated 81 comparable deaths in Thedwastre South
- Early deaths from cancer are estimated to occur at a relatively high rate in the division while early deaths from circulatory and coronary heart disease occur at a fairly low rate

CRIME & COMMUNITY SAFETY



- The crime rate for Thedwastre South is low when compared to Mid Suffolk and Suffolk as a whole
- In 2015, there were just under 24 recorded crimes per 1,000 residents in Thedwastre South compared to 37 in Mid Suffolk and 59 across the county as a whole
- The most commonly recorded type of crime in the division is "other theft", in line with both the district and county overall
- Criminal damage and violence without injury are the next most commonly recorded types of crime, again in line with the picture in Mid Suffolk and Suffolk
