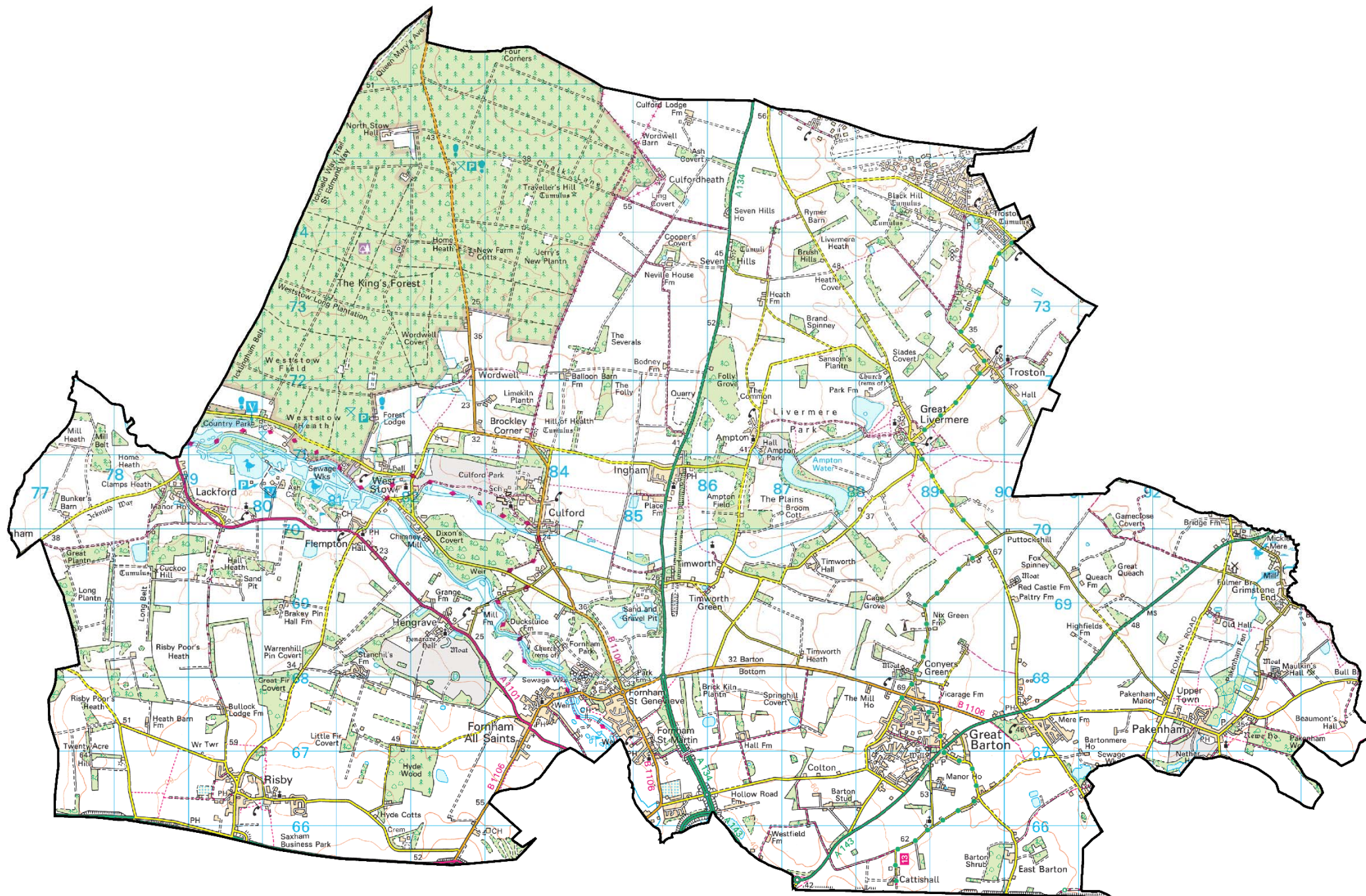

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ELECTORAL DIVISION PROFILES: AN INTRODUCTION

These profiles have been produced to support elected members, constituents and other interested parties in understanding the demographic, economic, social and educational profile of their neighbourhoods. We have used the latest data available at the time of publication.

Much more data is available from national and local sources than is captured here, but it is hoped that the profile will be a useful starting point for discussion, where local knowledge and experience can be used to flesh out and illuminate the information presented here.

The profile can be used to help look at some fundamental questions e.g.

- Does the age profile of the population match or differ from the national profile?
- Is there evidence of the ageing profile of the county in all the wards in the Division or just some?
- How diverse is the community in terms of ethnicity?
- What is the impact of deprivation on families and residents?
- Does there seem to be a link between deprivation and school performance?
- What is the breakdown of employment sectors in the area?
- Is it a relatively healthy area compared to the rest of the district or county?
- What sort of crime is prevalent in the community?

All areas of the county are covered, right down to district, ward and parish level, with information easily accessible in a variety of formats. You can also build your own reports by different themes and topics.

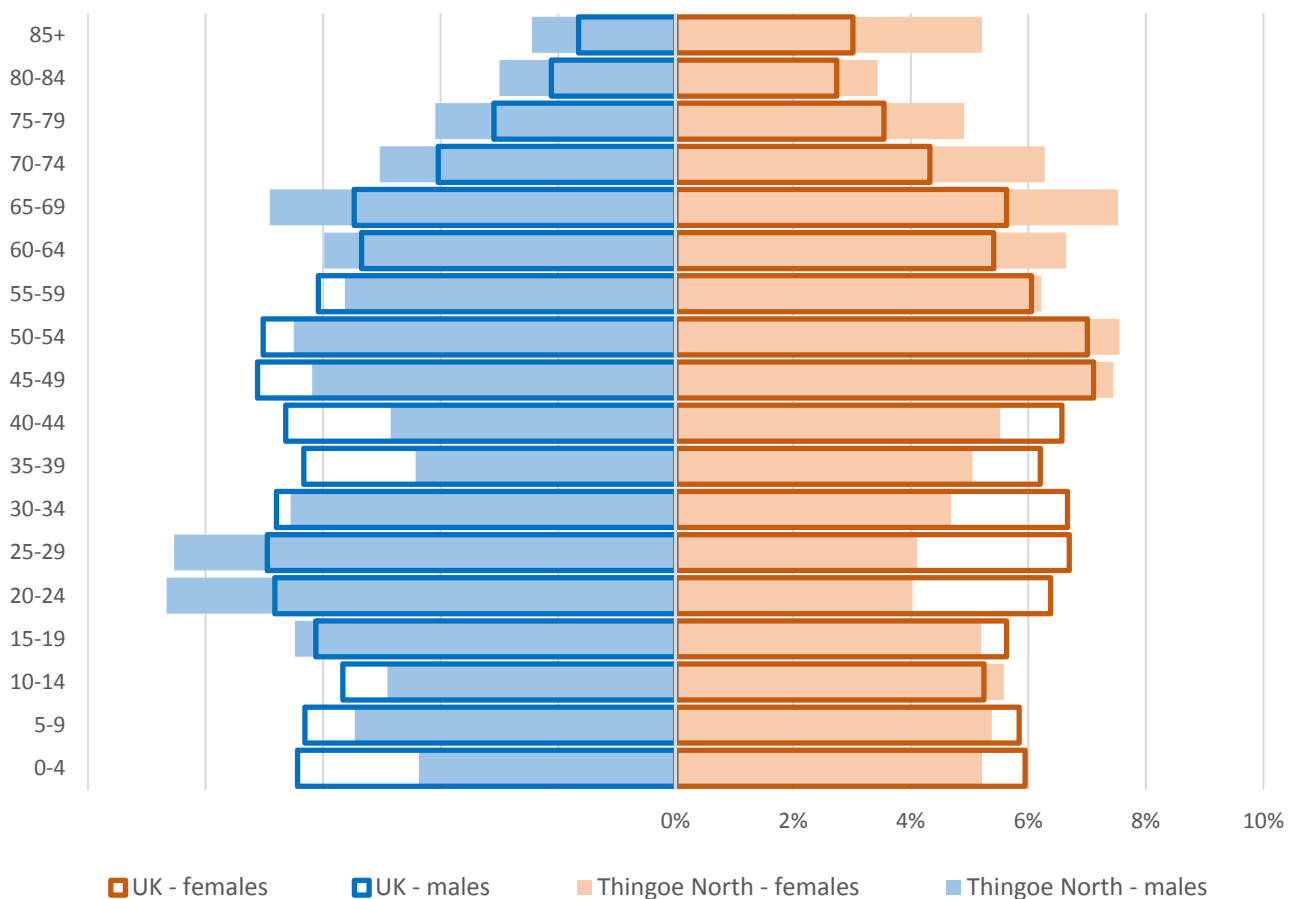
Technical Notes:

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE - AGE

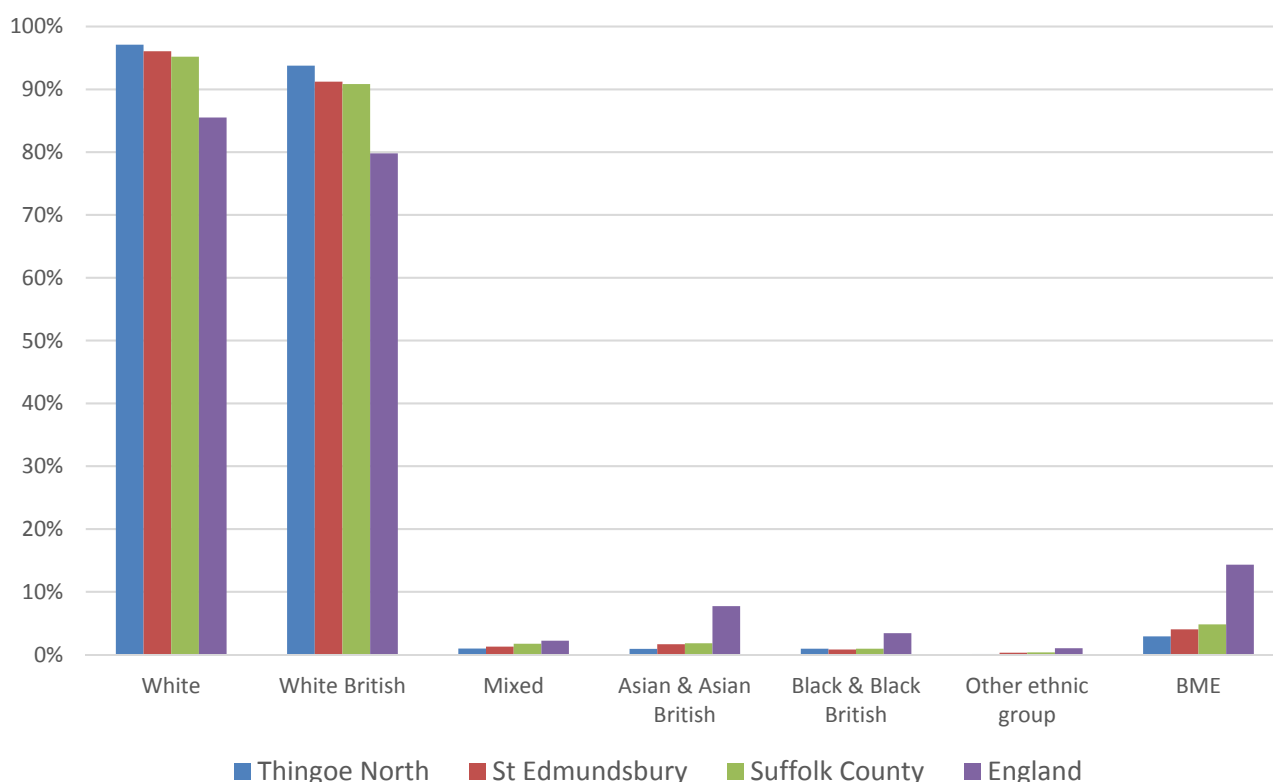
In mid-2015, the population of Thingoe North stood at 10,291, an increase of 0.04% since 2011. The age structure of the component wards and the division as a whole is set out below.

- The age pyramid for Thingoe North shows a higher than average proportion of people over the age of 60, and a much higher than average proportion of males aged between 20 and 29
- The most common age group in Thingoe North is 65-69 year olds, followed by 50-54 year olds
- There is a lower than average number of people between the ages of 30 and 44

ETHNICITY

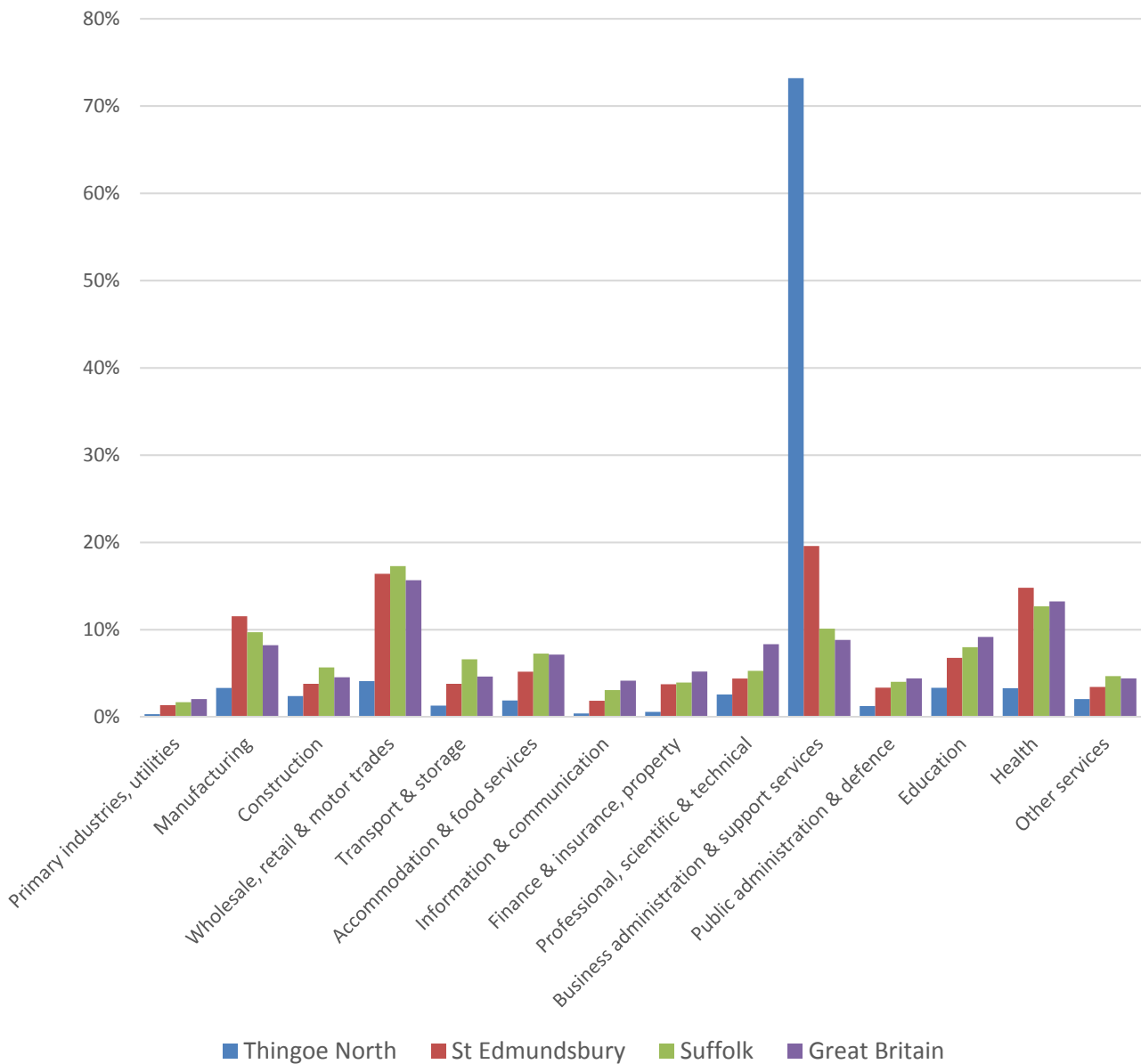


- According to the latest data (2011 Census), 97.1% (9,988) of the population of Thingoe North are white, which is nearly average for a division in Suffolk. 344 people are non-white British
- There are 299 (2.9%) people of black or minority ethnic origin in the division, one and a half times the number at the time of the 2001 Census
- Thingoe North has a similar diversity profile to St Edmundsbury borough, and generally lower proportions of minority ethnic groups than Suffolk as a whole

ECONOMY

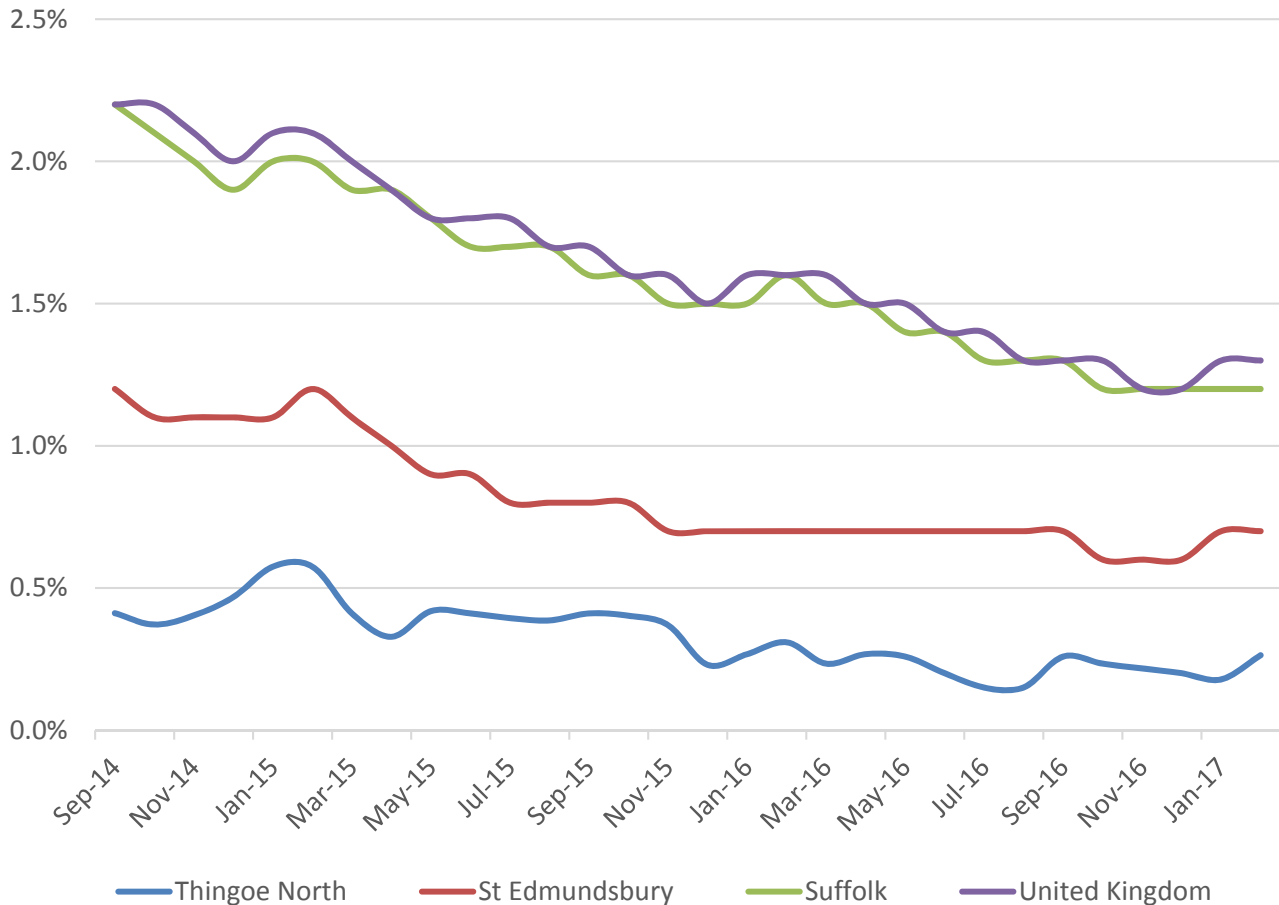
There are 13,100 people employed in Thingoe North.



- The key employment sector in Thingoe North is business administration and support services, with over 70% of jobs in the division provided by this sector
- Levels of employment in this sector in Thingoe North are much higher than the borough, county and national averages
- There is also significant employment of several hundred people in the manufacturing, wholesale, retail and motor trades, education and health sectors

LABOUR MARKET

JOBSEEKERS ALLOWANCE CLAIMANT RATE



- The Job Seekers Allowance claimant rate in Thingoe North has seen a slight decline from September 2014 to February 2017, despite a small increase in recent months
- The claimant unemployment rate in the division is consistently below the St Edmundsbury borough average and below the level seen across Suffolk as a whole and the UK
- In percentage terms, 0.3% of the working age population (aged 16-64) are claiming currently JSA, down from 0.4% in 2014

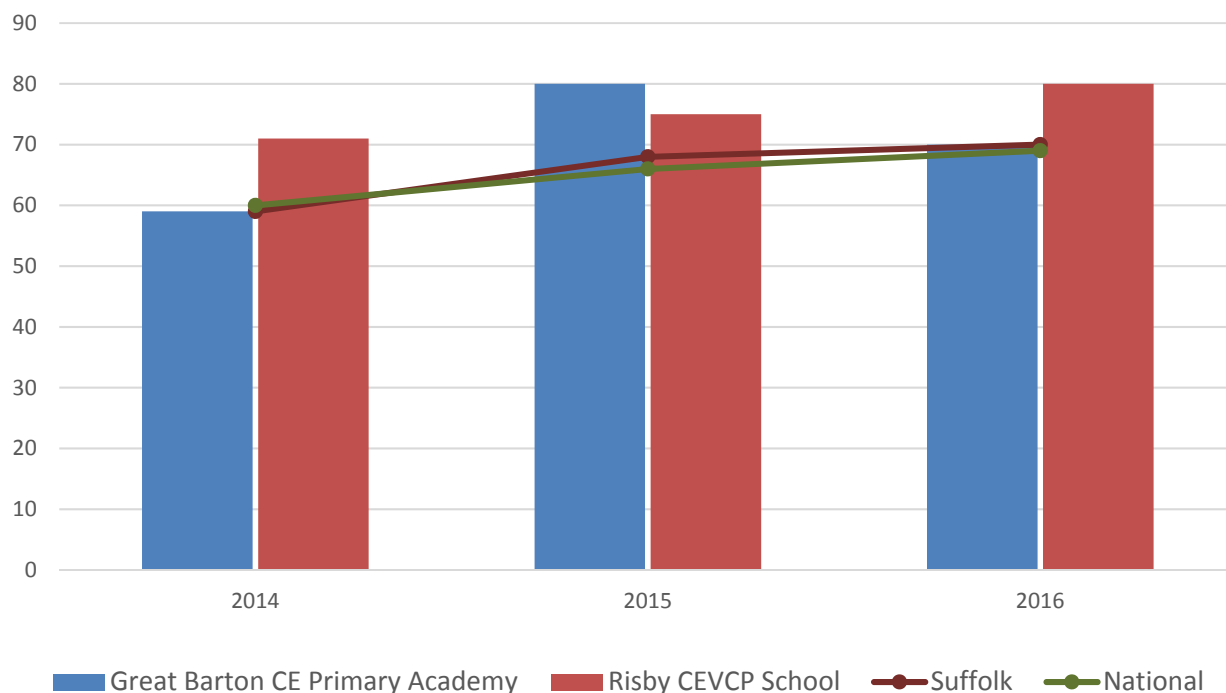

% pupils achieving Good Level of Development (GLD)

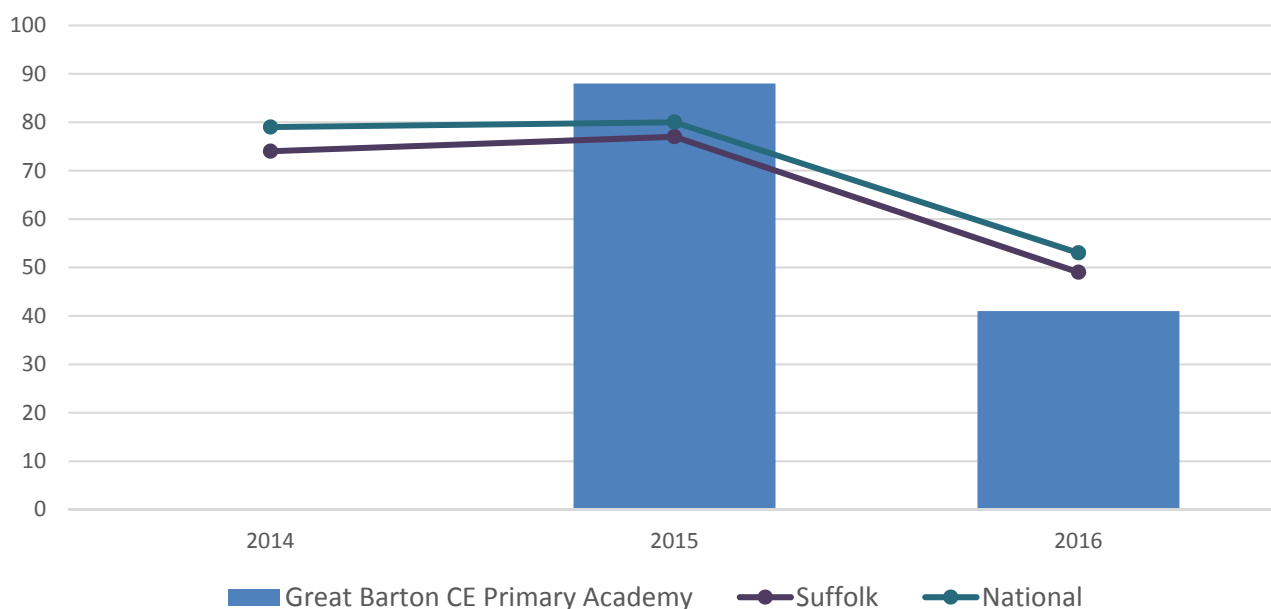


- Foundation stage attainment at Risby CEVCP School has increased steadily from 2014 to 2016 and remained consistently above the Suffolk and national averages
- Attainment at Great Barton Church of England Primary Academy has fluctuated over the course of the last three years, improving considerably in 2015 when 80% of pupils achieved a Good Level of Development (significantly higher than the national average of 66%), before falling back to the national average in 2016 at 70%

Key Stage 2 (age 11)

Pupil Achievement in all three subjects, Reading, Writing and Mathematics
(2014–2015 as % Level 4 or better & 2016 % Expected Level or better)

In July 2016, there was a change in the way pupil achievement is measured at the end of KS2. Prior to 2016, pupils received National Curriculum Level grades for English and Maths, with L4 being the expected level at the end of Key Stage 2. In 2016 the measure scaled score and shows whether or not a pupil has achieved the national standard for that subject

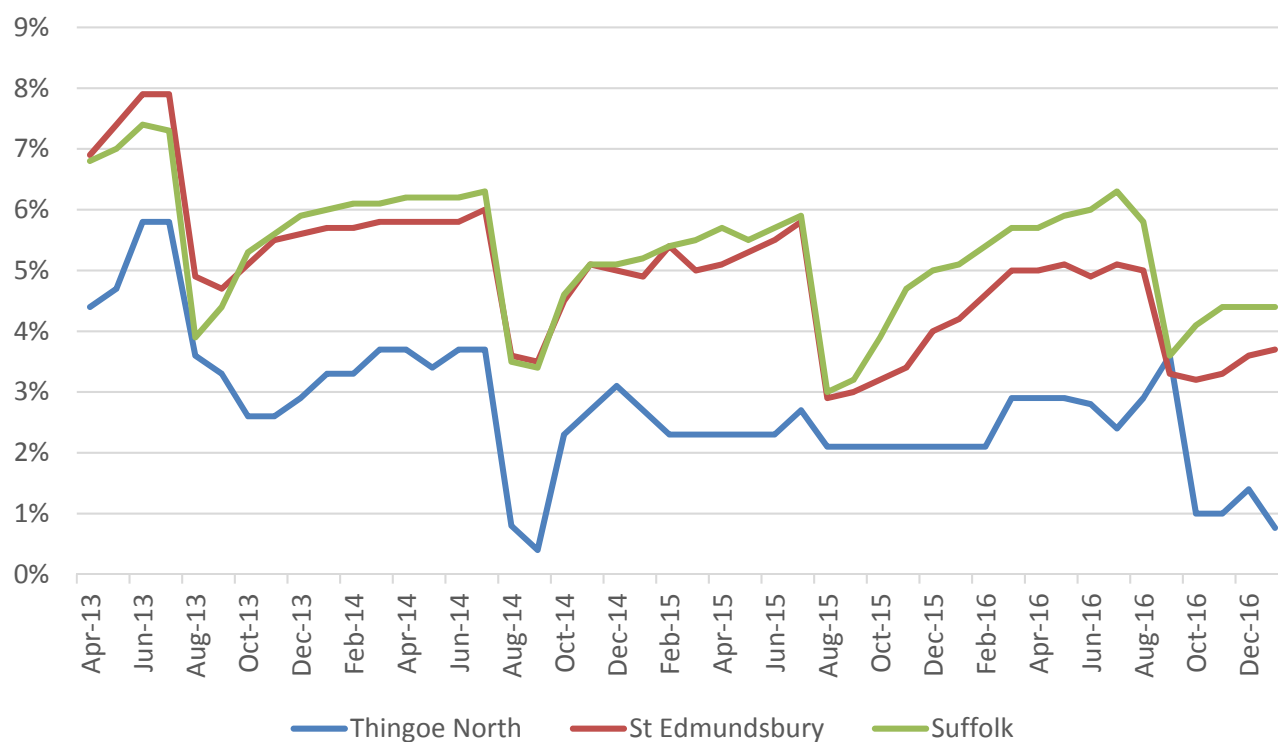


- Great Barton Church of England Primary Academy Key Stage 2 attainment data is available from 2015
- In 2015, attainment at the school was high, with 88% of pupils achieving level 4 or better in English and mathematics. This is significantly higher than the national average of 80% and the Suffolk-wide figure of 77%
- In 2016, attainment at the school was below average, with 41% of pupils achieving the expected level or better in reading, writing and mathematics compared to 53% nationally and 49% in Suffolk

GCSE (Key Stage 4) (age 16)

There are no Upper schools located within the Thingoe North division

NEET % (NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING)

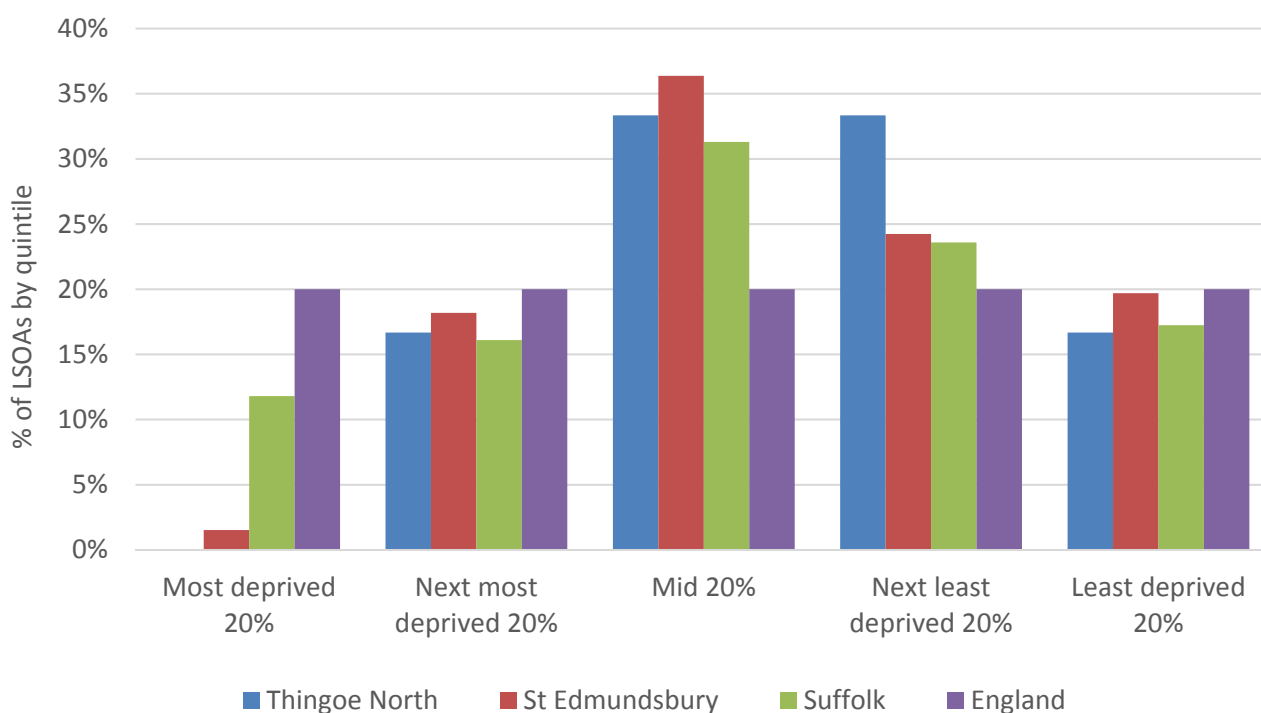


- In January 2017, 0.8% of 16-18 year olds were classified as NEET in Thingoe North (where current activity is known)
- NEET levels in Thingoe North have been consistently below the county and borough averages

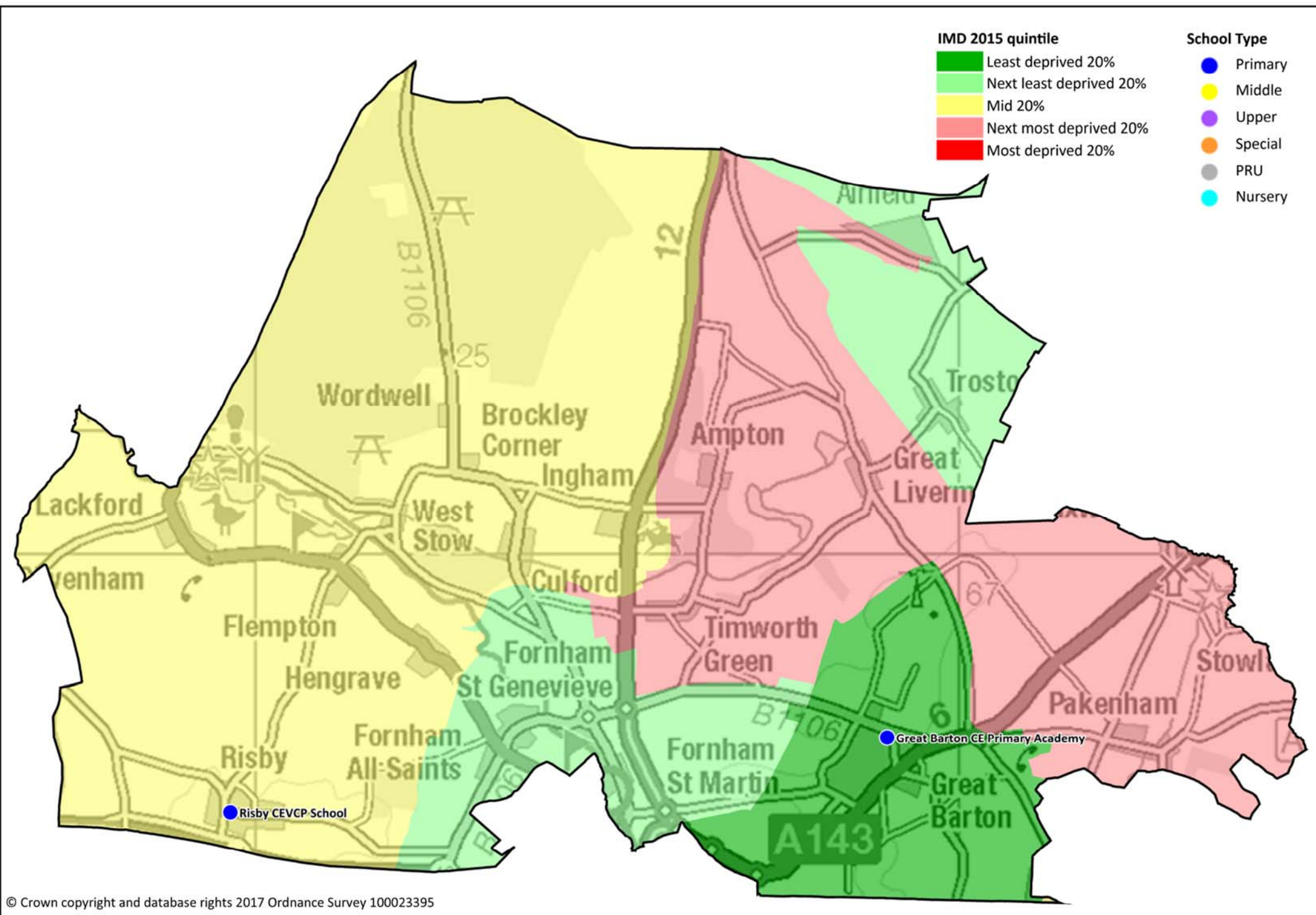
INDEX OF MULTIPLE DEPRIVATION (IMD) 2015 (SEE MAP OVERLEAF)

The IMD combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. Small areas (Lower Super Output Areas, average population 1,500) are most usually described as being in 1 of 5 quintile bands. The bottom quintile represents the 20% of areas that are the most deprived in the country. The top quintile represents the least deprived areas in the country, and is shaded green.

The Index is widely used to analyse patterns of deprivation, identify areas that would benefit from special initiatives or programmes and as a tool to determine eligibility for specific funding streams.



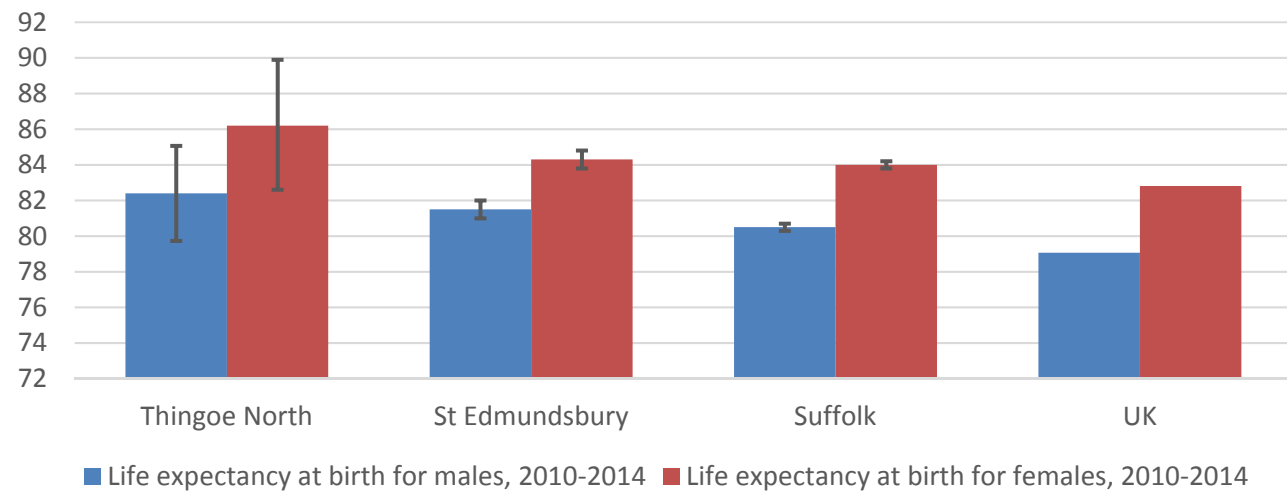
- The IMD 2015 shows that relative deprivation levels in Thingoe North are quite varied, with parts of the division distributed across four of the five deprivation quintiles
- Of the six Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOA) comprising the division, one is ranked in the 20% least deprived LSOAs in the country, two are in the next least deprived quintile (20%), two are in the mid quintile and one is in the second most deprived quintile



HEALTH

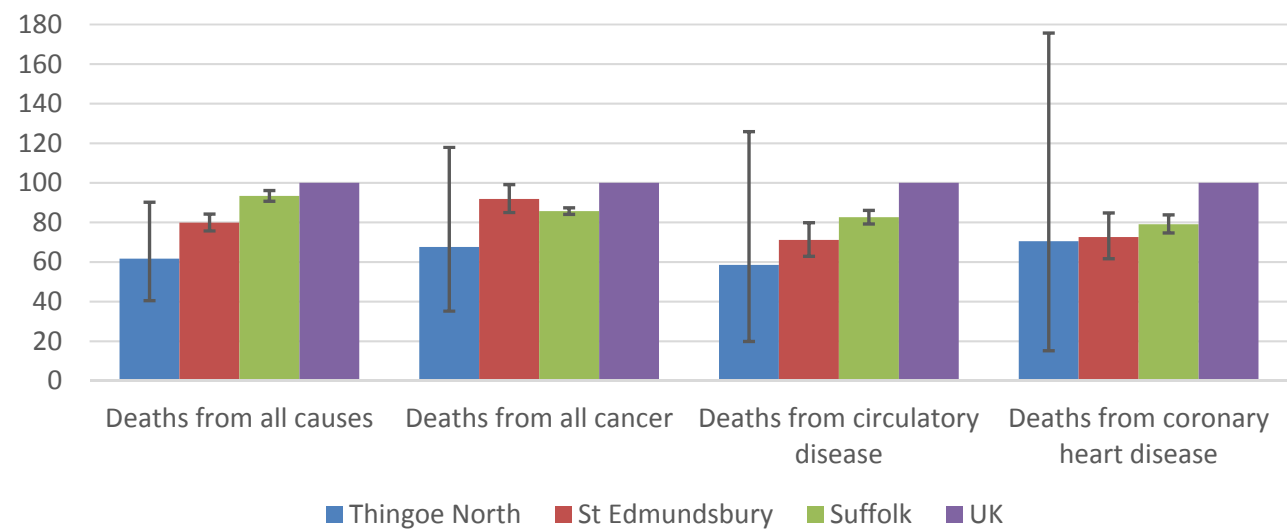
The local data used here is based on relatively small numbers. The confidence limits provide an indication of the reliability of the data. The 95% confidence intervals utilised on the chart provide a range within which there is 95% chance of the true result lying.

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH



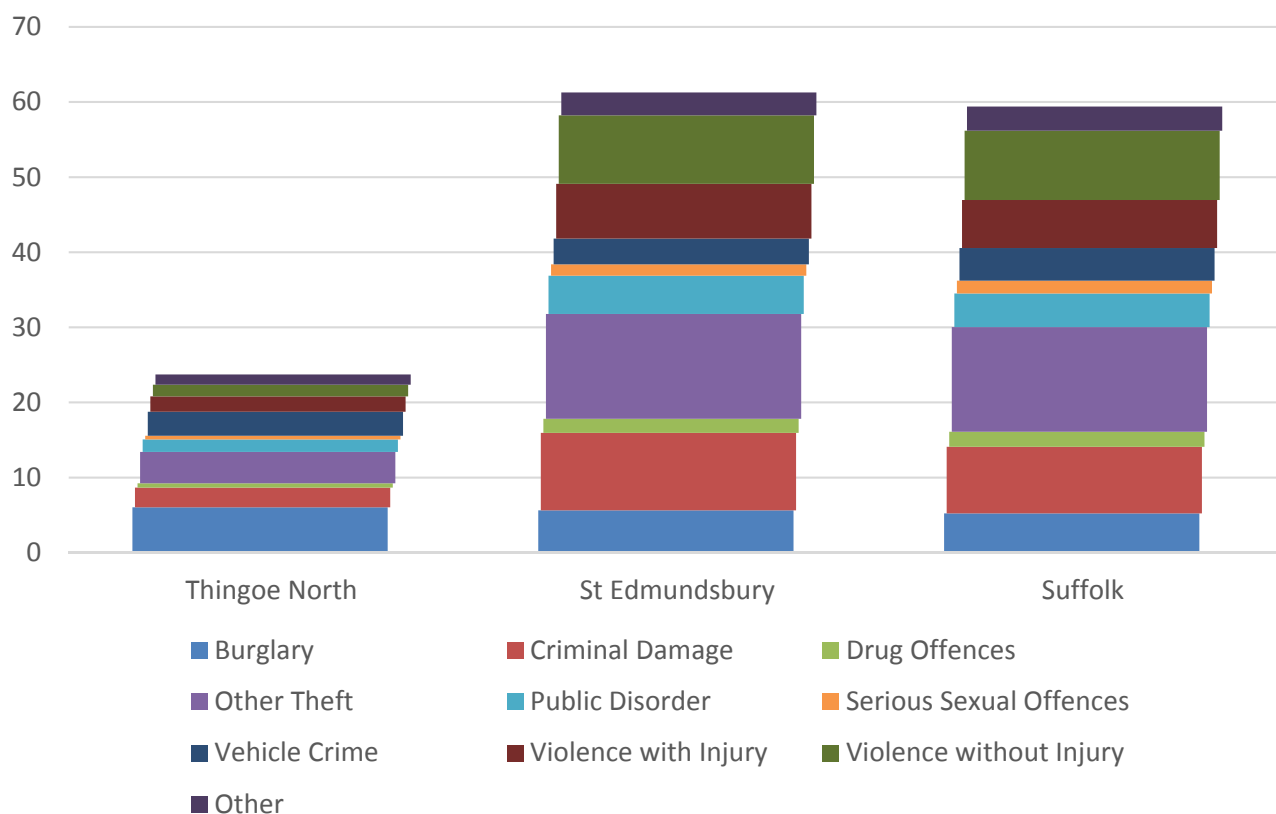
- The life expectancy estimate for women in Thingoe North is around 86; above the borough, county and national averages
- The figure for men is also above average at just over 82

DEATHS, UNDER 75 YEARS, STANDARDISED MORTALITY RATIO



- The estimates for rates of early deaths from all causes is significantly lower in Thingoe North the borough, county and national levels.
- The standardised mortality ratio data shown here means that for every 100 early deaths from all causes across the UK as a whole, there are an estimated 62 comparable deaths in Thingoe North

CRIME & COMMUNITY SAFETY



- Thingoe North shows a much lower rate of crime compared to the borough and county levels, with around 24 crimes per 1,000 population recorded in the division in 2015 compared to 61 per 1,000 residents across St Edmundsbury
- Burglary stands out as the most commonly recorded crime in the division by some margin, and the rate of 6 burglaries per 1,000 population is higher than that seen across St Edmundsbury and Suffolk as a whole
- The rates for all other types of crime are all lower than the borough and county average
