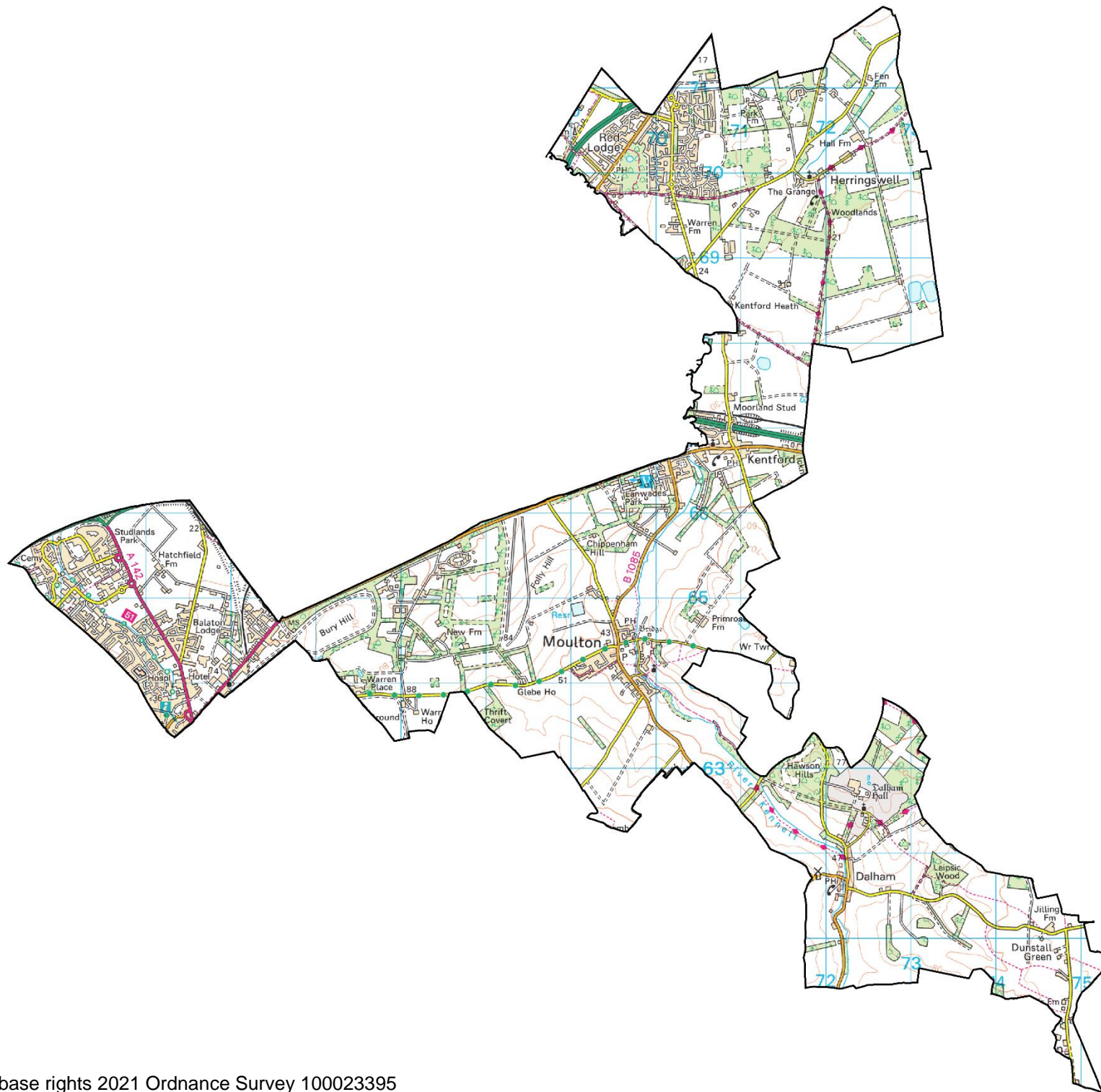

ELECTORAL DIVISION PROFILES: AN INTRODUCTION

These profiles have been produced to support elected members, constituents and other interested parties in understanding the demographic, economic, social and educational profile of their neighbourhoods. We have used the latest data available at the time of publication.

Much more data is available from national and local sources than is captured here, but it is hoped that the profile will be a useful starting point for discussion, where local knowledge and experience can be used to flesh out and illuminate the information presented here.

The profile can be used to help look at some fundamental questions e.g.

- Does the age profile of the population match or differ from the national profile?
- Is there evidence of the ageing profile of the county in all the wards in the Division or just some?
- How diverse is the community in terms of ethnicity?
- What is the impact of deprivation on families and residents?
- Does there seem to be a link between deprivation and school performance?
- What is the breakdown of employment sectors in the area?
- Is it a relatively healthy area compared to the rest of the district or county?
- What sort of crime is prevalent in the community?

The Suffolk Observatory is a free online resource that contains all Suffolk's vital statistics; it is the one-stop-shop for information and intelligence about Suffolk. Through data, reports and maps, the Suffolk Observatory provides a comprehensive picture of the County. It is a great source for useful facts and figures that can be used for writing reports and presentations, informing strategic and business planning, preparing funding applications or supporting academic research. Data is presented around the key themes of population, children and young people, health and social care, housing, crime and community safety, deprivation, economy and employment and environment. All areas of the county are covered, right down to district, electoral division, ward and parish level, with information easily accessible in a variety of formats. You can also build your own reports for custom areas.

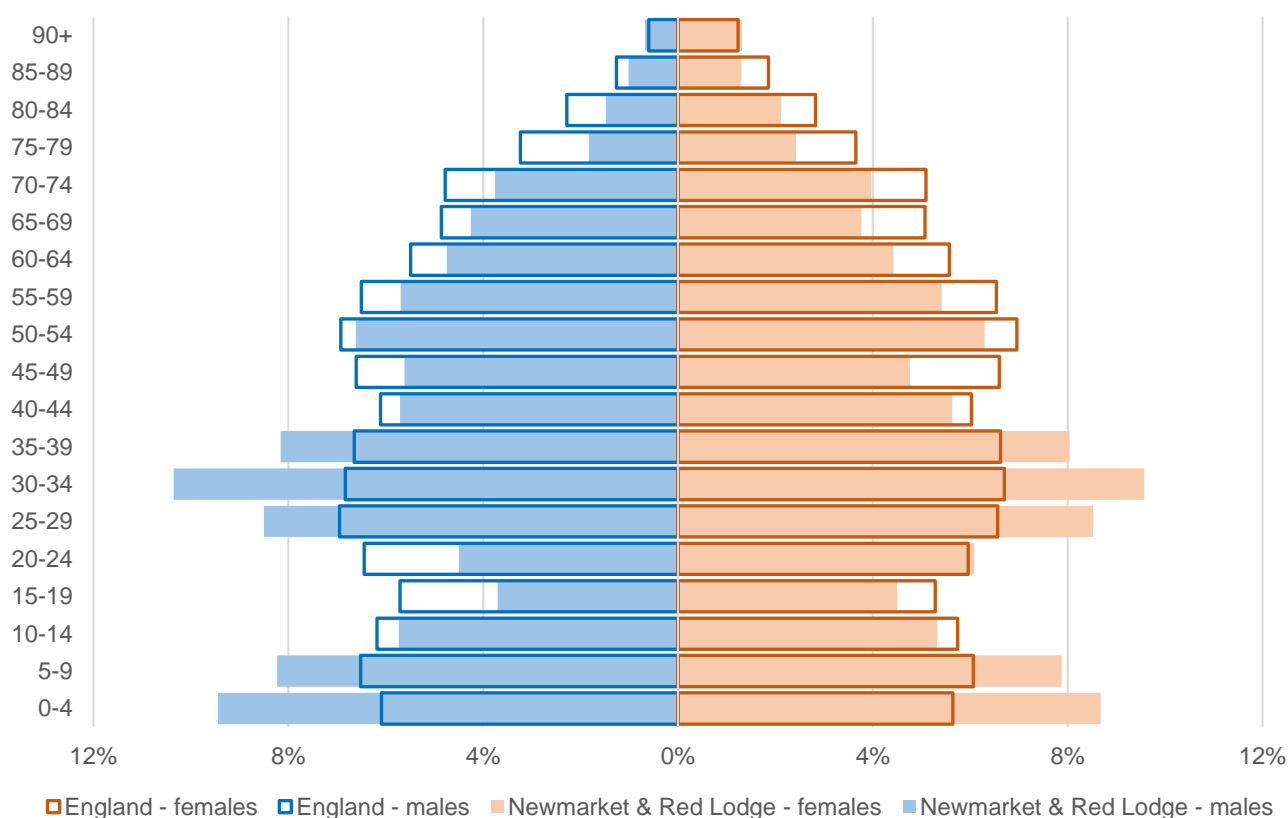
Technical Notes:

1. Where electoral divisions do not exactly match the boundaries at which the data is available (e.g. ward, Output Area or Lower Super Output Area), we have adopted a "best-fit" approach to produce a dataset.
2. District, county and national level data is provided where possible to provide a context for comparisons. Where possible we have used the most recent district boundaries for comparison purposes, but in some cases it has been necessary to use the pre-2019 districts.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE - AGE

In mid-2019, the population of Newmarket and Red Lodge stood at 15,086, an increase of 17.6% since the 2011 Census. The age structure of the component wards and the division as a whole is set out below.

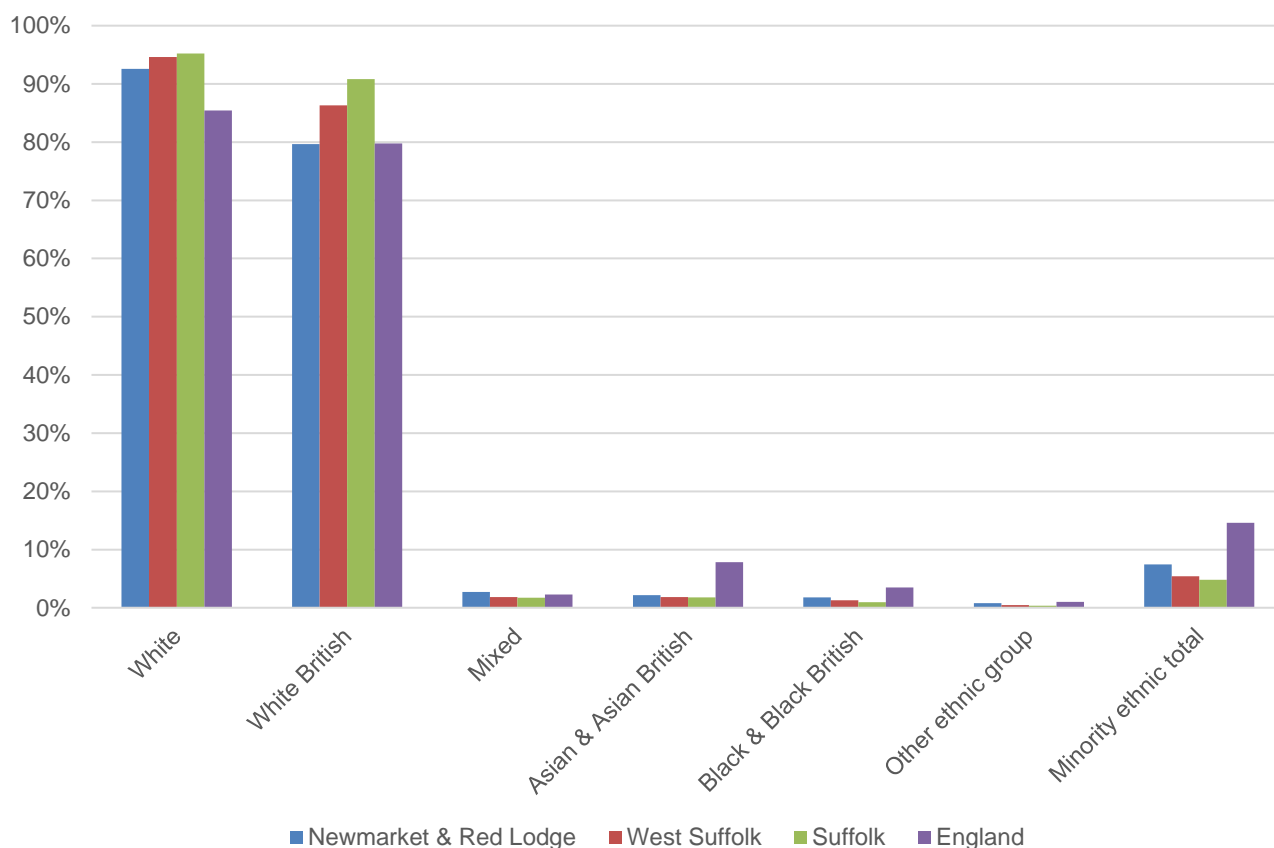

- The age pyramid for Newmarket and Red Lodge shows a far higher than average proportion of young families; people between the ages of 25 and 34, and under 10.

- The most common age group in Newmarket and Red Lodge is 30–34-year-olds, closely followed by young children aged under 5. The number of young children requiring school places looks set to increase in the coming years.
- There is a lower than average proportion of people of retirement age.

ETHNICITY

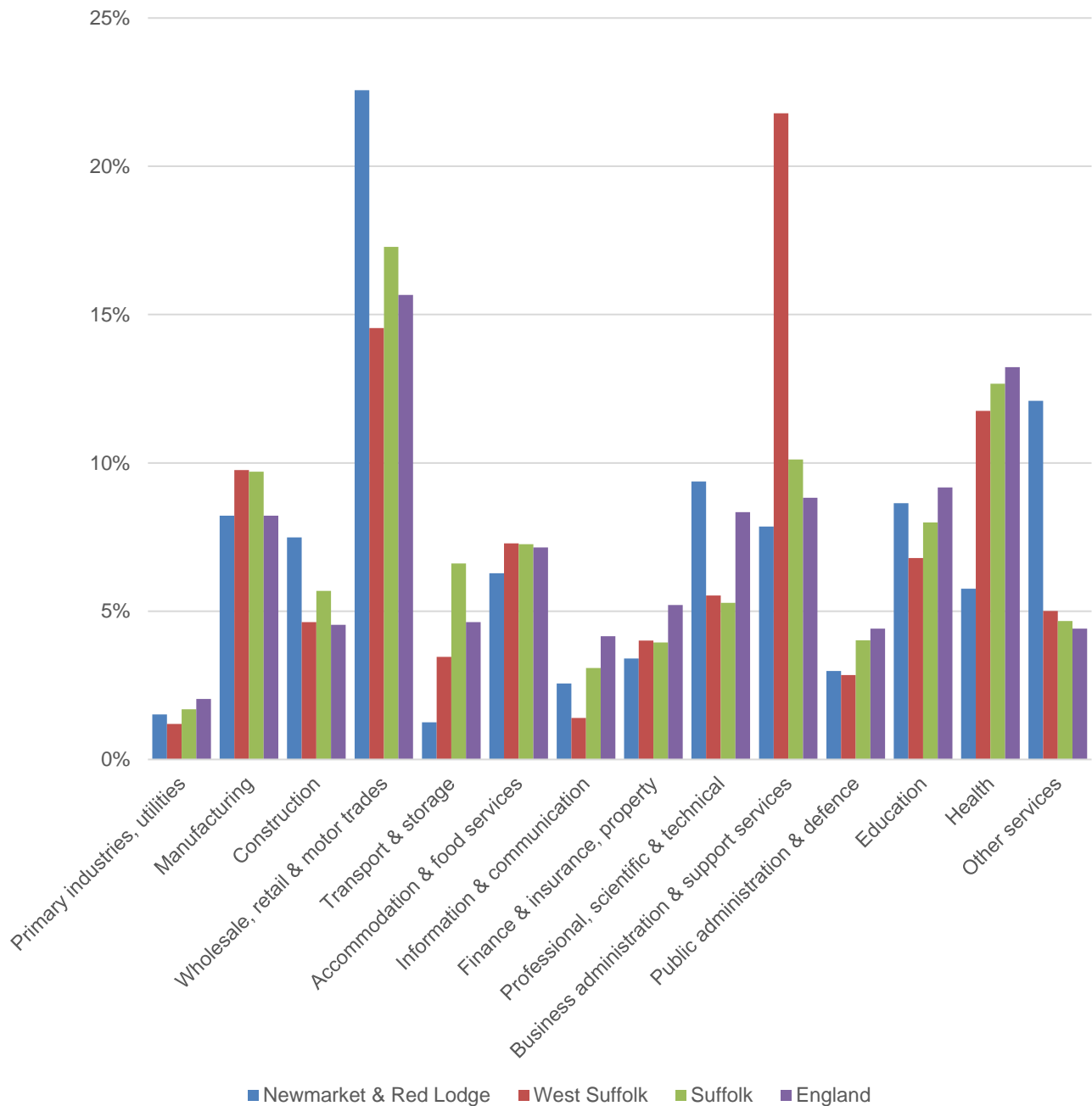


- According to the latest data (2011 Census), 92.6% of the population of Newmarket and Red Lodge are white.
- 7.4% of the population in this division are of other ethnic backgrounds
- Newmarket and Red Lodge has a more diverse population profile than West Suffolk and the county as a whole.

ECONOMY

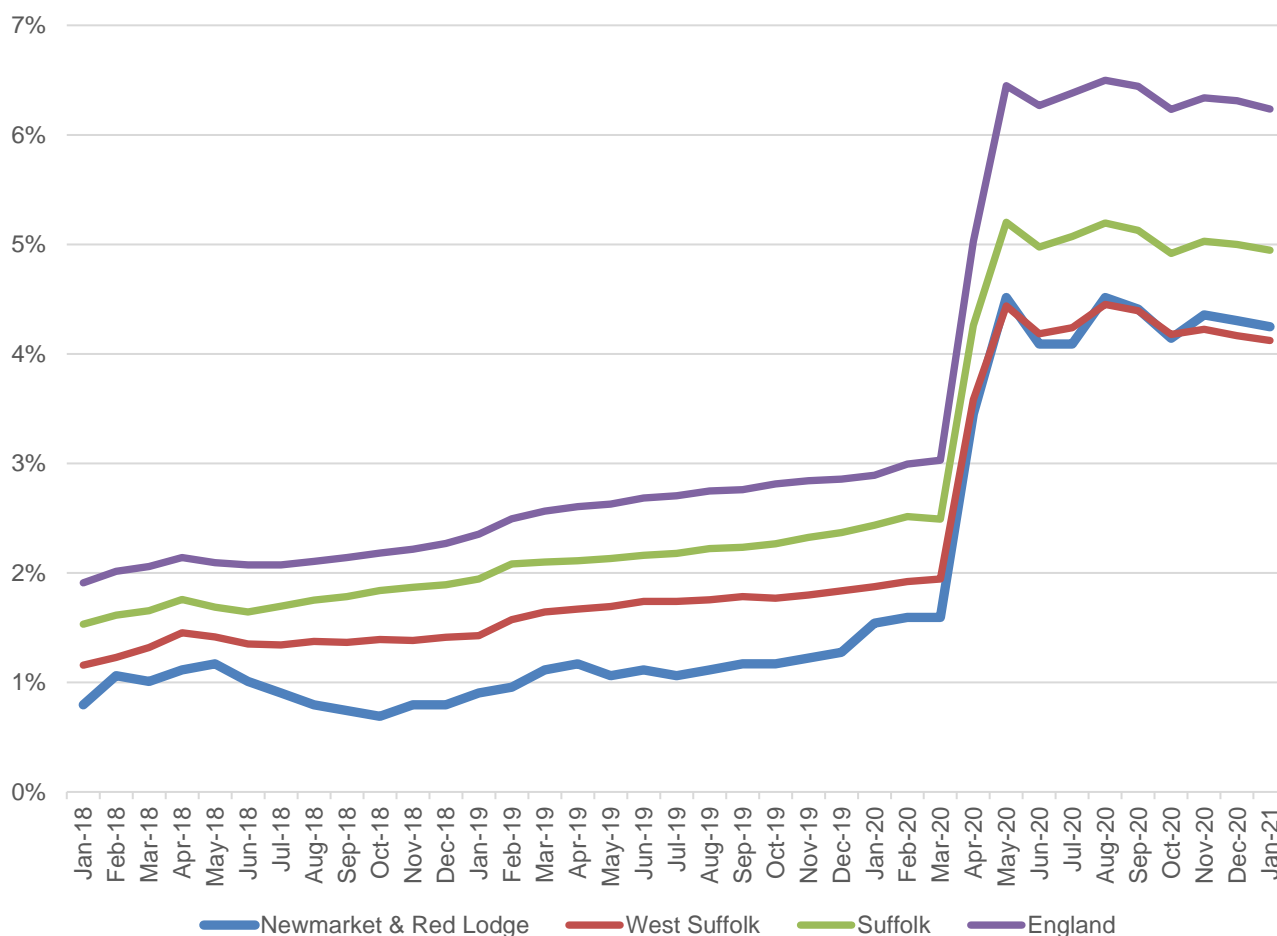
There are 9,600 people employed in Newmarket and Red Lodge.



- There is a good mix of employment in Newmarket and Red Lodge.
- The key employment sectors in the division are wholesale, retail and motor trades, other services, professional, scientific and technical activities, education and manufacturing.
- These five sectors account for nearly two thirds of jobs in the division.
- “Other services” consists of repairs, arts, cultural and sport services.

LABOUR MARKET

OUT-OF-WORK BENEFIT CLAIMANT RATE



- Newmarket and Red Lodge saw a sharp increase in claimants of out-of-work benefits in the first half of 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- In percentage terms, around 4.2% of the working age population (aged 16-64) were claiming out-of-work benefits according to the latest data from January 2021. The equivalent West Suffolk figure is 4.1%, the Suffolk average is 4.9% and the national average is 6.2%.
- Prior to the onset of the pandemic, the claimant rate in the division was consistently below the district, county and national average. Since April 2020, the rate in Newmarket and Red Lodge has followed the district average.

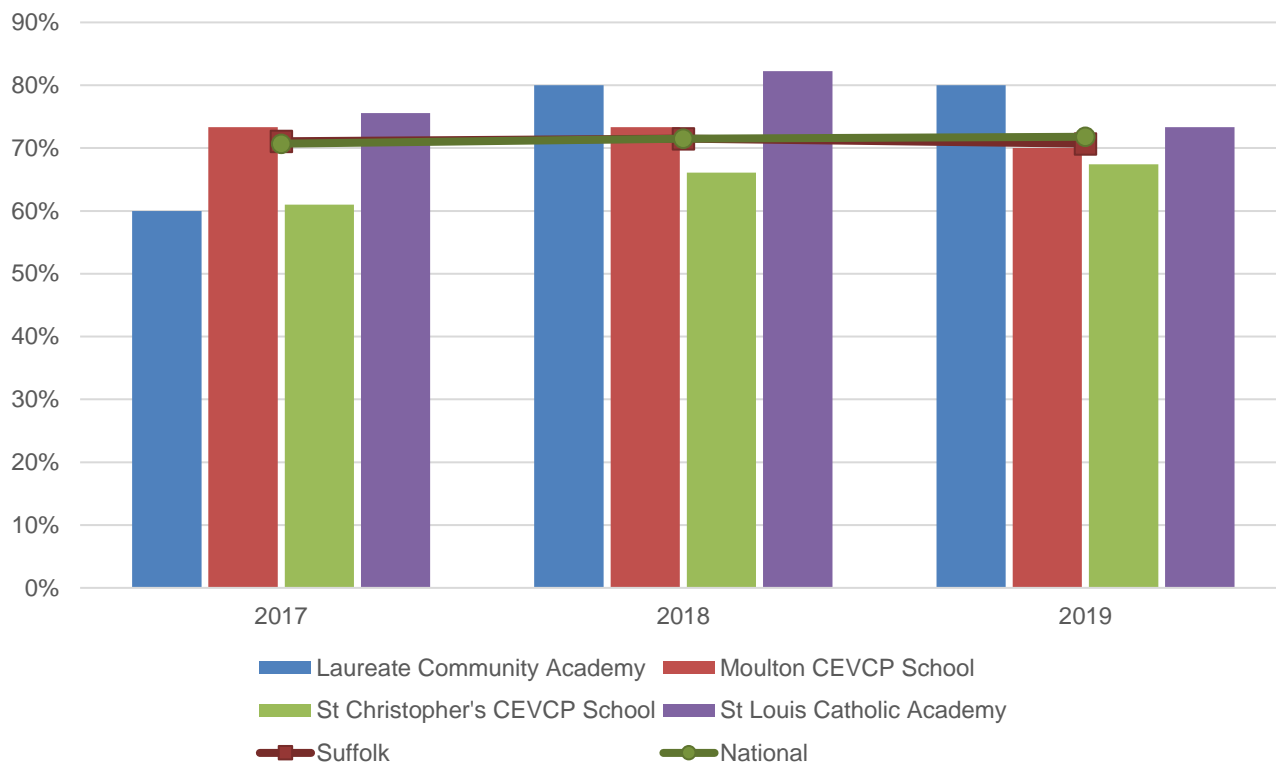

Foundation Stage Profile (reception)

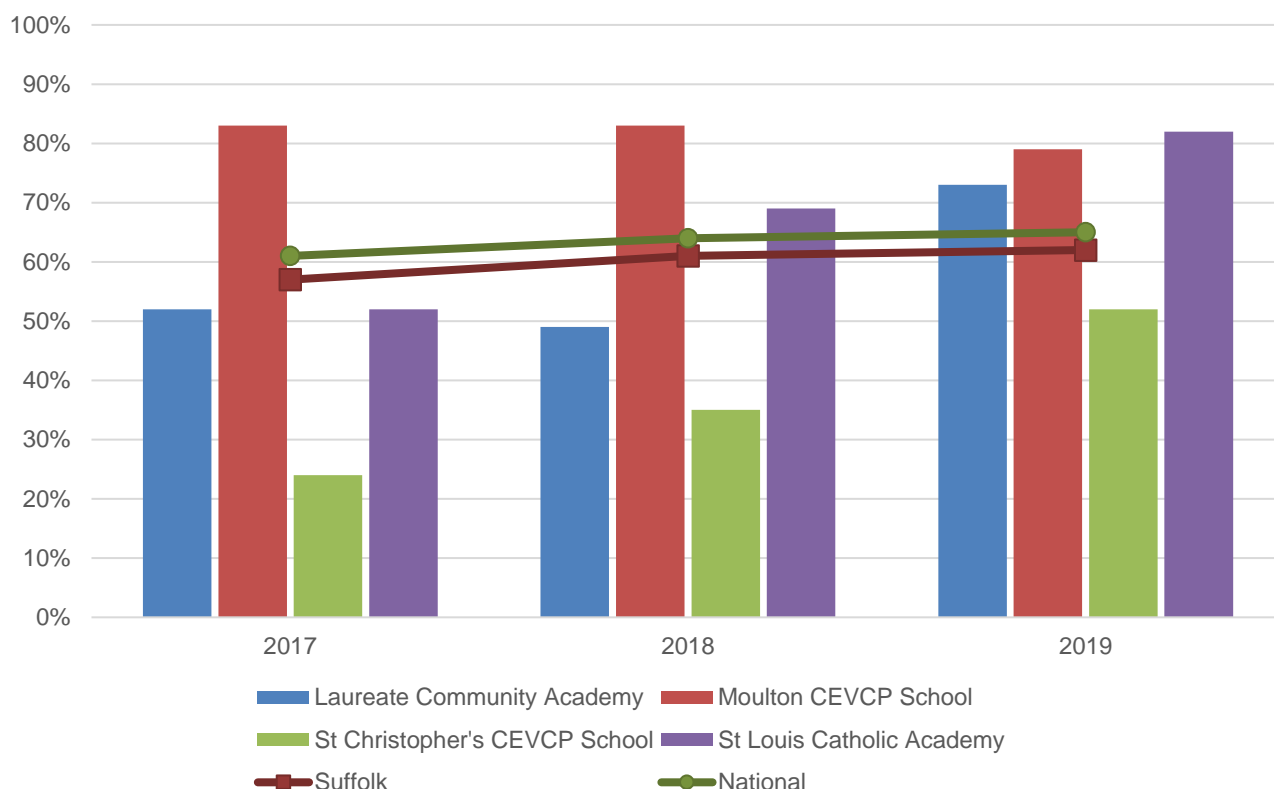
% pupils achieving Good Level of Development (GLD)



- Foundation Stage attainment at schools in Newmarket and Red Lodge has been generally good over the past three years of available data.
- However, St Louis Catholic Academy is the only school in the division at which attainment has been above the county and national average in each of the last three years.
- Attainment at Moulton CEVCP School has also been consistently high; just above average in 2017 and 2018.
- St Christopher's CEVCP is the only school in the division to see consistently below average Foundation Stage attainment during this period.
- Attainment at Laureate Community Academy was the highest of any school in the division in 2019 and also very strong in 2018 following below average results in 2017.

% pupils achieving the Expected Level or better in Reading, Writing and Mathematics

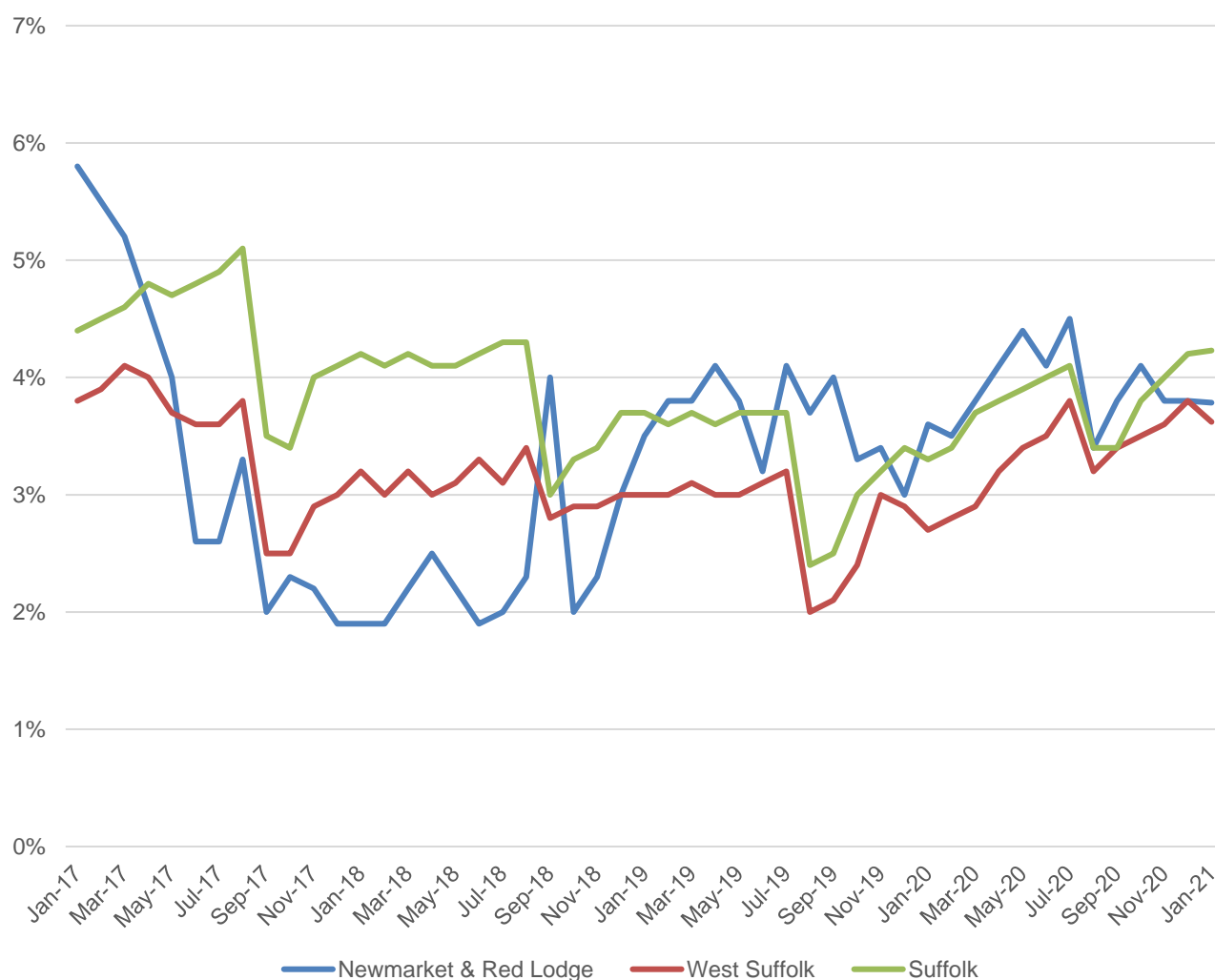


- Key Stage 2 attainment at Moulton CEVCP School has been consistently well above the county and national benchmarks over the most recent three years of available data.
- The percentage of pupils achieving the expected level or better in reading, writing and mathematics at other schools in the division has been rising during this period.
- St Christopher's CEVCP School has seen significant improvements in KS2 attainment in 2018 and 2019 but it remains below the county and national average.
- KS2 attainment at St Louis Catholic has also improved dramatically during this period and was above the county and national benchmarks in 2018 and 2019.
- Laureate Community Academy also saw above average attainment in 2019.

NEET % (NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING)

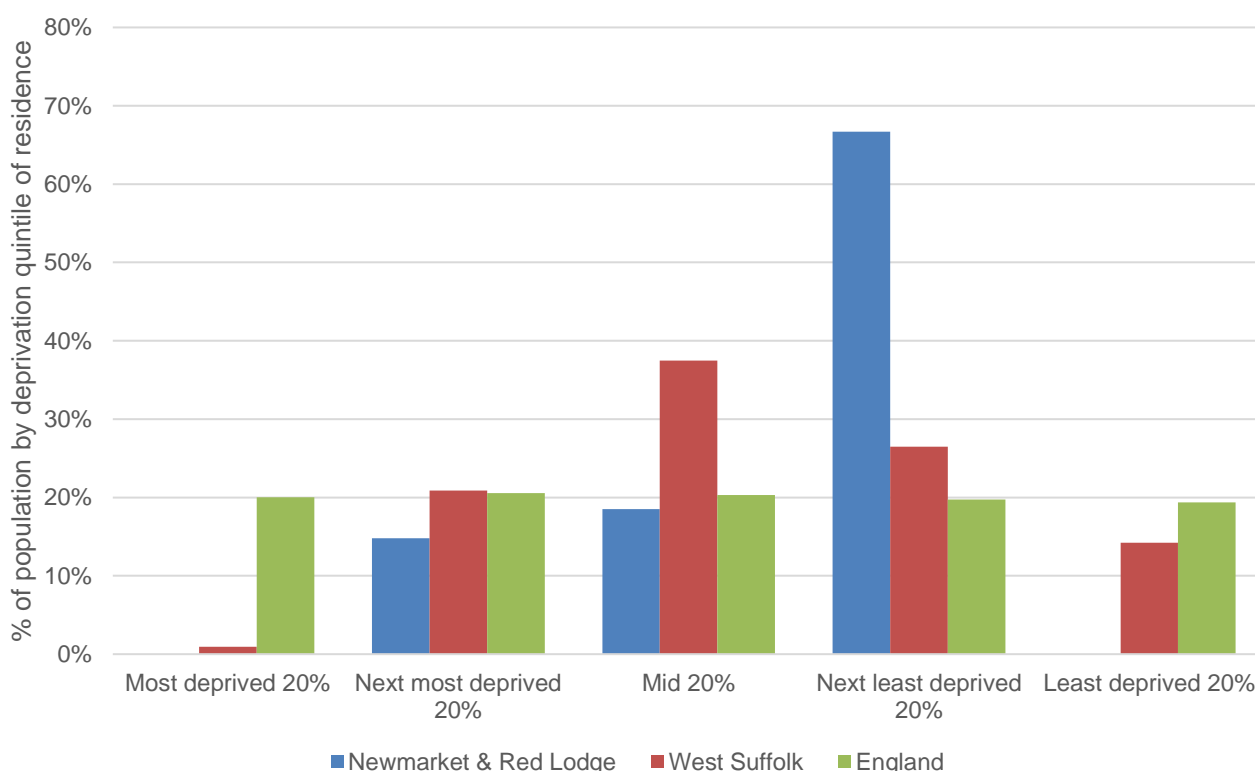


- In January 2021, 3.8% of 16-18-year-olds were classified as NEET in Newmarket and Red Lodge (where current activity is known).
- NEET levels in Newmarket and Red Lodge fluctuate considerably. According to the latest data the proportion of 16-18-year-olds classified as NEET is very similar to the district average and slightly below the county level.

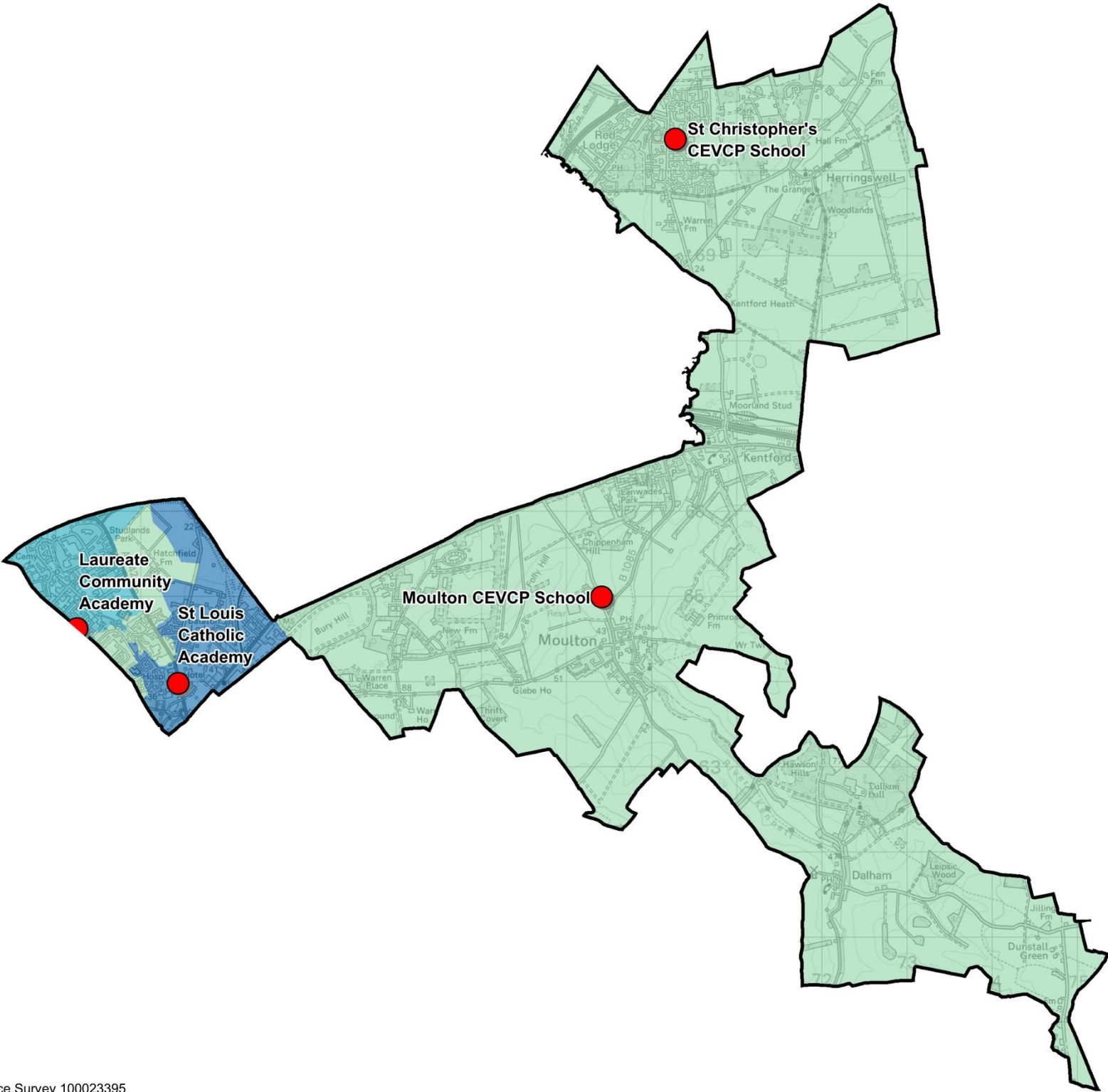
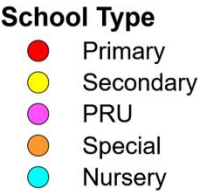
INDEX OF MULTIPLE DEPRIVATION (IMD) 2019 (SEE MAP OVERLEAF)

The IMD combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. Small areas (Lower Super Output Areas, average population 1,700) are most commonly described as being in 1 of 5 quintile bands. The bottom quintile represents the 20% of areas that are the most deprived in England; these are shaded pale yellow on the map. The top quintile represents the least deprived areas in England and is shaded dark blue.

The Index is widely used to analyse patterns of deprivation, identify areas that would benefit from special initiatives or programmes and as a tool to determine eligibility for specific funding streams.



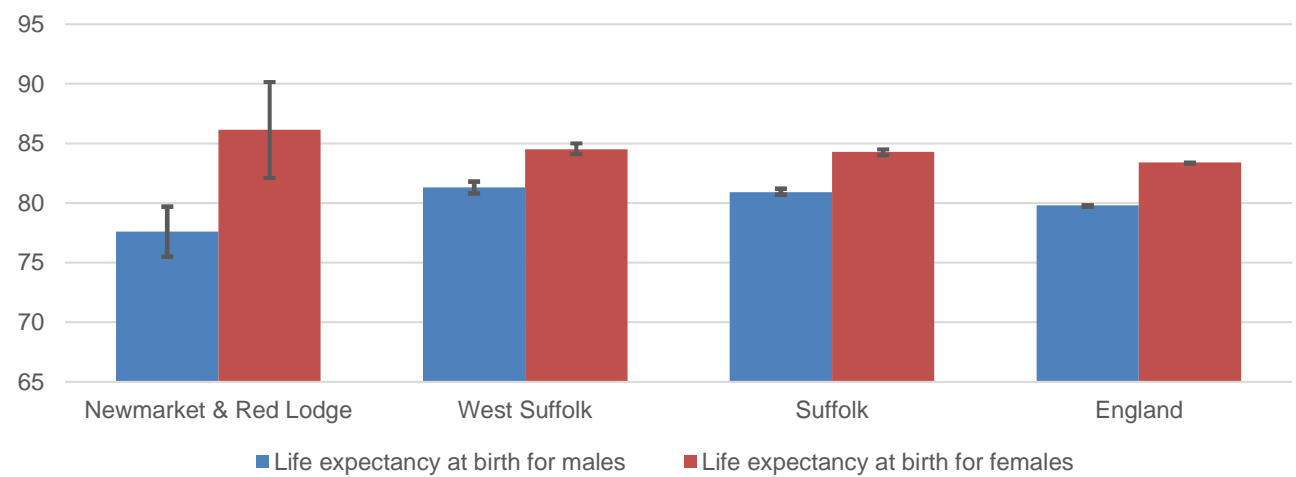
- The IMD 2019 shows that relative deprivation levels are moderate to low in Newmarket and Red Lodge division.
- Of the eight Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOA) comprising the division, five are ranked in the second least deprived 20% of LSOAs in the country (accounting for two-thirds of the population of the division), two are in the mid quintile and one is in the next most deprived quintile.



HEALTH

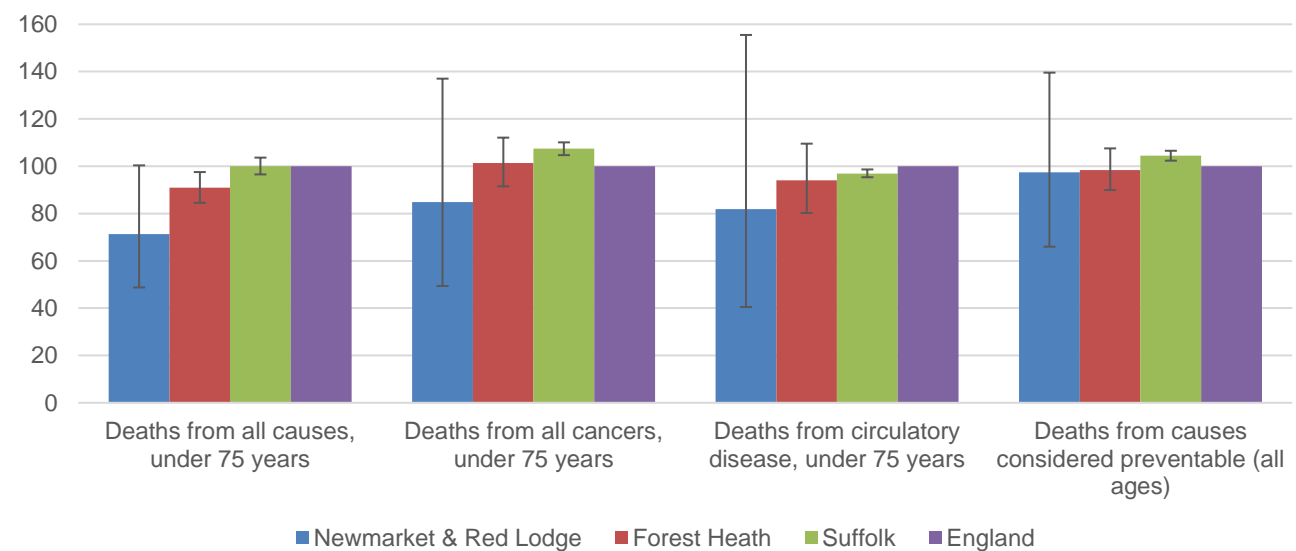
The local data used here is based on relatively small numbers. The confidence limits provide an indication of the reliability of the data. The 95% confidence intervals utilised on the chart provide a range within which there is 95% chance of the true result lying.

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH



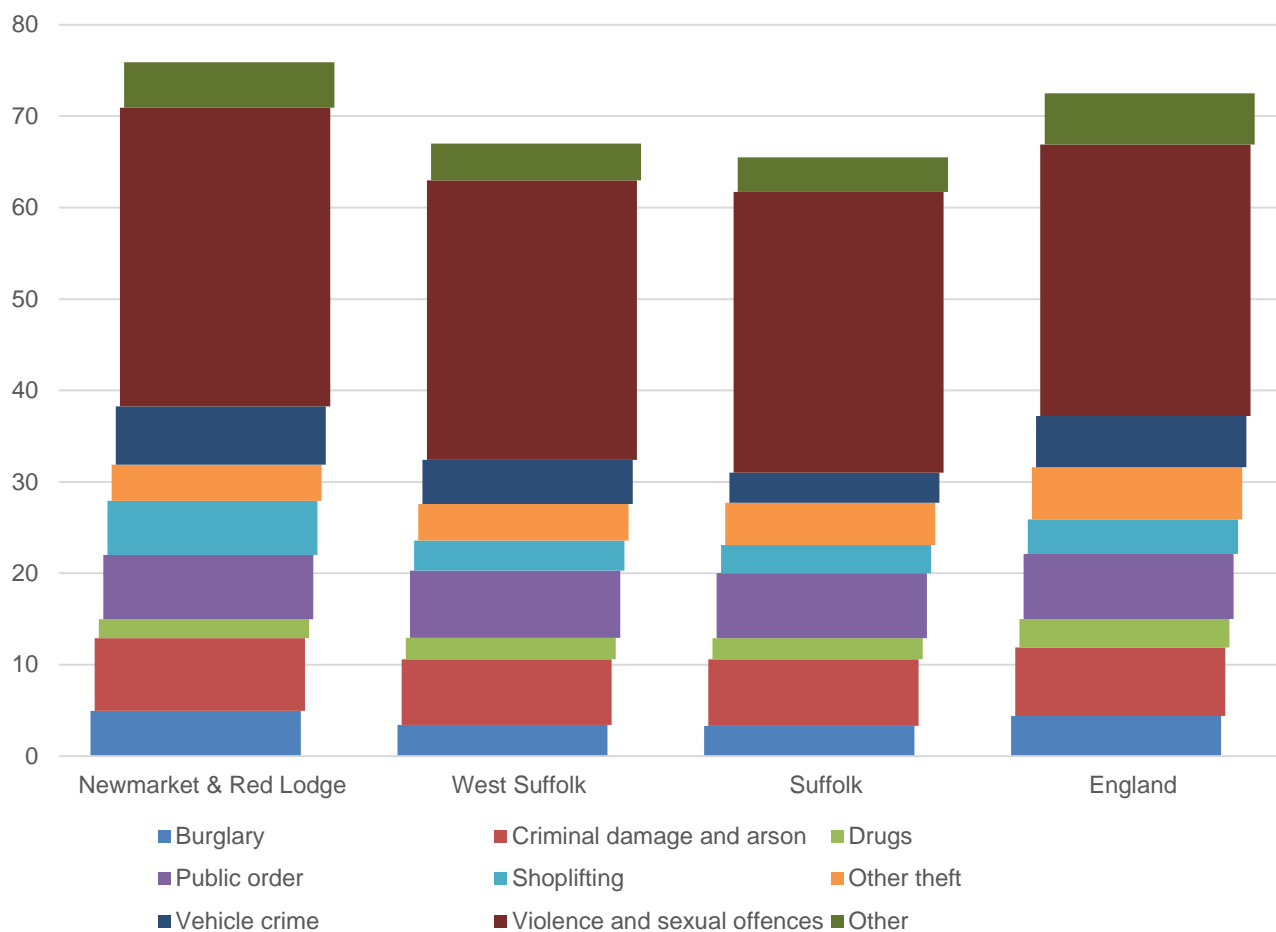
- Estimates for life expectancy in Newmarket and Red Lodge are below the district, county and England average for males and above average for females.
- The latest life expectancy at birth estimate for males in Newmarket and Red Lodge is 77.6, while for females it is 86.2. The equivalent figures for the county of Suffolk are 80.9 for males and 84.3 for females.

DEATHS, UNDER 75 YEARS, STANDARDISED MORTALITY RATIO



- The estimated early death rate for all causes in Newmarket and Red Lodge is below that for Forest Heath, Suffolk and England.
- The standardised mortality ratio data shown here means that for every 100 early deaths from all causes across England as a whole, there are an estimated 71 comparable deaths in Newmarket and Red Lodge.
- The confidence intervals around these data are significant due to the small number of deaths at the local level.

CRIME & COMMUNITY SAFETY



- Newmarket and Red Lodge has a higher rate of crime than the district and county average according to data for the year to the end of January 2021.
- During this period there were 76 crimes recorded in the division for every 1,000 residents, compared to 67 in West Suffolk and 66 in Suffolk as a whole.
- The crime profile in Newmarket and Red Lodge is fairly similar to the district and county profiles.
- Violence and sexual offences are the most common type of criminal activity recorded in the division, with more than 30 incidents per 1,000 residents during this period.
