





ELECTORAL DIVISION PROFILES: AN INTRODUCTION

These profiles have been produced to support elected members, constituents and other interested parties in understanding the demographic, economic, social and educational profile of their neighbourhoods. We have used the latest data available at the time of publication.

Much more data is available from national and local sources than is captured here, but it is hoped that the profile will be a useful starting point for discussion, where local knowledge and experience can be used to flesh out and illuminate the information presented here.

The profile can be used to help look at some fundamental questions e.g.

- Does the age profile of the population match or differ from the national profile?
- Is there evidence of the ageing profile of the county in all the wards in the Division or just some?
- How diverse is the community in terms of ethnicity?
- What is the impact of deprivation on families and residents?
- Does there seem to be a link between deprivation and school performance?
- What is the breakdown of employment sectors in the area?
- Is it a relatively healthy area compared to the rest of the district or county?
- What sort of crime is prevalent in the community?

Through data, reports and maps, the Suffolk Observatory provides a comprehensive picture of the County. It is a great source for useful facts and figures that can be used for writing reports and presentations, informing strategic and business planning, preparing funding applications or supporting academic research. Data is presented around the key themes of population, children and young people, health and social care, housing, crime and community safety, deprivation, economy and employment and environment. All areas of the county are covered, right down to district, electoral division, ward and parish level, with information easily accessible in a variety of formats. You can also build your own reports for custom areas.


Technical Notes:

- 1. Where electoral divisions do not exactly match the boundaries at which the data is available (e.g. ward, Output Area or Lower Super Output Area), we have adopted a "best-fit" approach to produce a dataset.
- District, county and national level data is provided where possible to provide a context for comparisons. Where possible we have used the most recent district boundaries for comparison purposes, but in some cases it has been necessary to use the pre-2019 districts.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE - AGE

In mid-2019, the population of Carlford stood at 9,029, an increase of 3.9% since the 2011 Census. The age structure of the the division is set out below.



 The age pyramid for Carlford shows a considerably higher-than-average proportion of people over the age of 45. The division has a relatively elderly age profile.

- The most common age group in Carlford is 50-54-year-olds, followed by 55-59-year-olds. The retirement age population currently accounts for 27% of the population of the division and looks set to continue to increase in the coming years.
- There is a much lower than average number of people between the ages of 20 and 39, and also under the age of 9.

ETHNICITY




- According to the latest ethnicity data (2011 Census), 98.5% (8,555) of the population of Carlford are white, one of the highest percentages for a division in Suffolk.
- There are 135 (1.5%) people of minority ethnic origin in the division.
- Carlford has lower proportions of minority ethnic groups than East Suffolk and Suffolk as a whole.

ECONOMY


There are 2,900 people employed in Carlford.



- The key employment sectors in Carlford are education, manufacturing, accommodation and food services, business administration and support services and construction.
- These five sectors account for two-thirds of jobs in the division.
- Education is a particular specialism in Carlford as it accounts for a much higher proportion of jobs in the division than elsewhere.

LABOUR MARKET

OUT-OF-WORK BENEFIT CLAIMANT RATE



- Carlford saw a sharp increase in claimants of out-of-work benefits in the first half of 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, much like the rest of the county and England as a whole.
- Claimant unemployment levels in the division are consistently below those of the district, county and England as a whole.
- In percentage terms, approximately 2.8% of the working age population of Carlford are claiming out-of-work benefits in January 2021.



SCHOOL ATTAINMENT

Foundation Stage Profile (reception)


% pupils achieving Good Level of Development (GLD)



- Foundation Stage attainment in the division has been relatively consistent according to the past three years of data, though some declines in performance were evident in 2019.
- Pupil attainment at Easton, Grundisburgh and Witnesham Primary Schools was above the county and national average in each of the last three years.
- Attainment at Otley Primary School has declined in the last two years and was well below average in 2019 in particular.
- Earl Soham Community Primary School had the highest Foundation Stage attainment of any school in the division in 2018, and a similar level of performance to the national average in 2017 and 2019.
- Attainment at Charsfield Church of England Primary School also peaked in 2018 but was otherwise below average.
- Bealings School saw slightly below average Foundation Stage attainment in 2017 before maintaining a strong level of performance in the two subsequent years.

% pupils achieving the Expected Level or better in Reading, Writing and Mathematics




- KS2 attainment has fluctuated markedly according to the past three years of data, perhaps due to the small cohort sizes at schools in the division.
- Easton Primary School has maintained KS2 attainment levels above the county and national average throughout this period.
- Attainment at Witnesham Primary School was also above both benchmarks in 2017 and 2018 and above the county level in 2019. Otley Primary School also saw two years of performance (2018 and 2019), as did Grundisburgh Primary School (2017 and 2019) that was above the county and national level and one year that exceeded the Suffolk average.
- No school has seen consistently below average attainment during this period.
- Pupil attainment at Earl Soham Community Primary School has declined over the course of the three years and was the lowest in the division in 2019.
- Bealings School saw attainment among the highest in the division in 2017 and 2019 but lower performance in 2018.
- Attainment at Charsfield Church of England Primary School was low in 2017 and 2018 but above the county and national averages in 2019.

Key Stage 4 (GCSE) (age 16) and Key Stage 5 (A Level) (age 18)

There are no Upper Schools located within the division.

NEET % (NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING)




- In January 2021, 2.7% of 16–18-year-olds in Carlford were classified as NEET (where current activity is known).
- NEET levels in Carlford are generally lower than the rate for East Suffolk and Suffolk.


INDEX OF MULTIPLE DEPRIVATION (IMD) 2019 (SEE MAP OVERLEAF)

The IMD combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. Small areas (Lower Super Output Areas, average population 1,700) are most commonly described as being in 1 of 5 quintile bands. The bottom quintile represents the 20% of areas that are the most deprived in England; these are shaded pale yellow on the map. The top quintile represents the least deprived areas in England and is shaded dark blue.

The Index is widely used to analyse patterns of deprivation, identify areas that would benefit from special initiatives or programmes and as a tool to determine eligibility for specific funding streams.




- The IMD 2019 shows that deprivation levels in Carlford are moderate to low, with all LSOAs in the division classified among the least deprived 60% in England.
- Of the four Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOA) comprising the division, one is ranked in the top 20% least deprived LSOAs in the country, one in the next least deprived 20% and two are in the mid-20%. The distribution of the population across these LSOAs is shown in the chart above.
- No part of the division is ranked in the most deprived 40% of areas in England.



HEALTH


The local data used here is based on relatively small numbers of deaths. The confidence limits provide an indication of the reliability of the data. The 95% confidence intervals utilised on the chart provide a range within which there is 95% chance of the true result lying.

LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH




- Estimated life expectancy at birth for both males and females in Carlford is above the East Suffolk, Suffolk and England averages.
- The estimated figure for male life expectancy in the division is 83.5 years (80.9 across Suffolk), while for females it is more than 2 years longer, at 85.7 years (84.3 is the Suffolk average).

DEATHS, UNDER 75 YEARS, STANDARDISED MORTALITY RATIO



- The estimates for rates of early deaths from all causes, cancers and circulatory disease are lower in Carlford than the district, county and national levels.
- The standardised mortality ratio data shown here means that for every 100 early deaths from all causes across England as a whole, there are an estimated 60 comparable deaths in Carlford.
- It should be noted that the confidence intervals around these data are particularly wide due to the small number of deaths at the local level.

CRIME & COMMUNITY SAFETY



- Carlford has a lower rate of crime than the district, county and national average.
- In the year to the end of January 2021, there were 29 recorded crimes per 1,000 residents in Carlford compared to 59 in East Suffolk and 66 across the county as a whole.
- Violence and sexual offences accounted for almost half of all recorded crimes in the division during this period.
- The rate of burglaries in Carlford is noticeably higher than the district average with 6.6 incidents recorded per 1,000 people compared to 2.9 in East Suffolk. Otherwise, all types of crime are recorded at a lower rate than across East Suffolk as a whole.
