





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#### **ELECTORAL DIVISION PROFILES: AN INTRODUCTION**

These profiles have been produced to support elected members, constituents and other interested parties in understanding the demographic, economic, social and educational profile of their neighbourhoods. We have used the latest data available at the time of publication.

Much more data is available from national and local sources than is captured here, but it is hoped that the profile will be a useful starting point for discussion, where local knowledge and experience can be used to flesh out and illuminate the information presented here.

The profile can be used to help look at some fundamental questions e.g.

- Does the age profile of the population match or differ from the national profile?
- Is there evidence of the ageing profile of the county in all the wards in the Division or just some?
- How diverse is the community in terms of ethnicity?
- What is the impact of deprivation on families and residents?
- Does there seem to be a link between deprivation and school performance?
- What is the breakdown of employment sectors in the area?
- Is it a relatively healthy area compared to the rest of the district or county?
- What sort of crime is prevalent in the community?

Data is presented around the key themes of population, children and young people, health and social care, housing, crime and community safety, deprivation, economy and employment and environment. All areas of the county are covered, right down to district, electoral division, ward and parish level, with information easily accessible in a variety of formats. You can also build your own reports for custom areas.


#### **Technical Notes:**

- 1. Where electoral divisions do not exactly match the boundaries at which the data is available (e.g. ward, Output Area or Lower Super Output Area), we have adopted a "best-fit" approach to produce a dataset.
- District, county and national level data is provided where possible to provide a context for comparisons. Where possible we have used the most recent district boundaries for comparison purposes, but in some cases it has been necessary to use the pre-2019 districts.

# **DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE - AGE**

In mid-2019, the population of Martlesham stood at 11,407, an increase of 5.5% since the 2011 Census. The age structure of the component wards and the division as a whole is set out below.



 The age pyramid for Martlesham shows a higher-than-average proportion of people in every age band over the age of 50.

- The most common age group in Martlesham is 70-74-year-olds, followed by 60-64-year-olds. The number of people of retirement age is already high and looks set to increase markedly in the coming years.
- There is a much lower than average number of people in the younger working age groups in the division, particularly 20-39-year-olds, as well as children under 10 years of age.

#### **ETHNICITY**




- According to the latest data (2011 Census), 95.8% (10,364) of the population of Martlesham are white, with 93.4% white British.
- There are 451 (4.2%) people of minority ethnic origin in the division, some way above the district average.
- Martlesham has a similar diversity profile to Suffolk county, with the proportion of the population from minority ethnic groups higher than the district average.

## **ECONOMY**


There are 10,500 people employed in Martlesham.



- Information and communication is by far the most important sector in Martlesham in terms of employment, with almost a third of workers in the division employed in this field
- Such is the dominance of information and communication to employment in the division that almost all other sectors have below average proportions of employment
- Just over a fifth of employment in Martlesham is in wholesale, retail and motor trades; slightly above the district and county average.
- Public administration and defence is also a relatively important sector in the division, accounting for more than 1 in 12 jobs.

### LABOUR MARKET

#### **OUT-OF-WORK BENEFIT CLAIMANT RATE**



- Martlesham saw a sharp increase in claimants of out-of-work benefits in the first half of 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, much like the rest of the county and England as a whole.
- Claimant unemployment levels in the division are consistently below those of the district, county and England as a whole.
- In percentage terms, approximately 2.2% of the working age population of Martlesham are claiming out-of-work benefits in January 2021.



#### SCHOOL ATTAINMENT

#### **Foundation Stage Profile (reception)**


% pupils achieving Good Level of Development (GLD)



- Foundation Stage attainment at schools in Martlesham division is generally good.
- Pupil attainment at all schools in the division has been very similar to or above the national average from 2017 to 2019.
- Birchwood Primary, Bucklesham Primary, Nacton Church of England Primary and Waldringfield Primary Schools have all had Foundation Stage attainment that is above the national benchmark in each of the last three years.
- Of the schools in the division, only Martlesham Primary Academy has seen attainment dip below the national average (2017 and 2018), though the gap was only around one percentage point on both occasions.

#### Key Stage 2 (age 11)

- Key Stage 2 attainment in Martlesham division is generally good but has seen some fluctuations over the last three years.
- Of the schools in the division, only Nacton Church of England Primary has seen attainment levels that are consistently above the national average during this period. However, attainment at Birchwood Primary has been above the county average in each year presented here.
- Pupil attainment at Martlesham Primary Academy and Waldringfield Primary School has been below the national average in two of the last three years.

#### Key Stage 4 (GCSE) (age 16) and Key Stage 5 (A Level) (age 18)

There are no Upper Schools located within the division.

# **NEET % (NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING)**




- In January 2021 around 1.5% of 16–18-year-olds were classified as NEET in Martlesham (where current activity is known).
- NEET levels in Martlesham are generally below the district and county averages.


# INDEX OF MULTIPLE DEPRIVATION (IMD) 2019 (SEE MAP OVERLEAF)

The IMD combines a number of indicators, chosen to cover a range of economic, social and housing issues, into a single deprivation score for each small area in England. This allows each area to be ranked relative to one another according to their level of deprivation. Small areas (Lower Super Output Areas, average population 1,700) are most commonly described as being in 1 of 5 quintile bands. The bottom quintile represents the 20% of areas that are the most deprived in England; these are shaded pale yellow on the map. The top quintile represents the least deprived areas in England and is shaded dark blue.

The Index is widely used to analyse patterns of deprivation, identify areas that would benefit from special initiatives or programmes and as a tool to determine eligibility for specific funding streams.




- The IMD 2019 shows that relative deprivation levels in Martlesham are moderate to low, with all parts of the division ranked in the least deprived 60% of areas nationally.
- Of the seven Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOA) comprising the division, four are ranked in the top 20% least deprived LSOAs in the country (home to 60% of the population of the division as shown in the chart above), with two in the next best quintile and one in the mid quintile.



#### **HEALTH**


The local data used here is based on relatively small numbers of deaths. The confidence limits provide an indication of the reliability of the data. The 95% confidence intervals utilised on the chart provide a range within which there is 95% chance of the true result lying.

#### LIFE EXPECTANCY AT BIRTH




- Estimated life expectancy at birth for both males and females in Martlesham is above the East Suffolk, Suffolk and England averages.
- The estimated figure for male life expectancy in the division is 82 years (80.9 across Suffolk), while for females it is more than 5 years longer, at 87.6 years (84.3 is the Suffolk average).

#### DEATHS, UNDER 75 YEARS, STANDARDISED MORTALITY RATIO



- In Martlesham, early deaths from all causes and cancers are estimated to be below the district, county and England level, indicating that health in the division is above average.
- The standardised mortality ratio data shown here means that for every 100 early deaths from all causes across England as a whole, there are an estimated 70 comparable deaths in Martlesham.
- Early deaths from circulatory disease and deaths from causes considered preventable across all ages occur at a similar rate to across East Suffolk and below the Suffolk and England level.
- It should be noted that the confidence intervals around these data are particularly wide due to the small number of deaths at the local level.

#### CRIME & COMMUNITY SAFETY



- Crime levels in Martlesham are relatively high, with a rate of 88 crimes recorded per 1,000 residents in the year to the end of January 2021.
- This compares to a rate of 59 crimes per 1,000 residents in East Suffolk and 66 in Suffolk across the same period.
- As elsewhere, violence and sexual offences is the most common type of crime in the division, accounting for more than 40% of all recorded crime during this period.
- A number of types of crime occur at a significantly higher rate in Martlesham. Other crime was recorded at a rate of 11.8 incidents per 1,000 residents in the division compared to 3.8 in Suffolk. There were 6.8 shoplifting crimes recorded per 1,000 people in the division compared to 3.1 in Suffolk.
